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Multiple fire crews save burning home on Upper Lake Road

Highlands-Cashiers Land Trust (HCLT) is under contract on 100 acres of raw and pristine land in Cashiers.

Fully surrounded by the US Forest Service, this property is visible from Whiteside Mountain and protects streams in the Chattooga watershed. Located off Bull Pen Road, it is home to many rare and endemic species of plants and animals.

Thanks to the support of a generous private foundation and HCLT's Donors, the Twigg Tract will remain untouched and conserved forever, a huge win for conservation!

Highlands-Cashiers Land Trust is a nationally accredited non-profit organization that has been conserving land on the Plateau since 1909, making it the oldest land trust in North Carolina and one of the oldest in the state. HCLT works with private landowners to voluntarily conserve their property for the purpose of protecting the natural places that give us so much including clean water, fresh air, moderate temperatures, and unparalleled beauty.

As we face continuing challenges from biodiversity loss and a changing climate, the work of HCLT is more important than ever. The devastating aftermath of Hurricane Helene highlights the urgent need for resilience and action to protect the natural places that provide our best defense against these growing threats.

Conservation is a powerful way to make a difference. Forests store carbon, reducing greenhouse gases while providing stunning landscapes, recreational opportunities, and critical habitats • See HCLT page 17

Last Town Board meeting of 2024 is tonight

hursday, December 12, is the last Town Board meeting of the year. The board meeting will begin at 7 pm at the Highlands Community Building next to the ballfield. You can remotely access the meeting via the portal on the town website. No workshop session before the board meeting is scheduled for this month, but they will resume at the beginning of the new year.


Normally, the board meeting in December has a light agenda. This time, there are some major items to be reviewed before the end of the year.

The most important item will probably be a request from Highlands Festival Inc. to move this year's Bear Shadow event to Founders Park at the start of May. For several years, Bear Shadow has enjoyed a successful run at a farm property in Scaly Mountain. That property is no longer available, and the organizers have not been able to locate a comparable venue in the area. A few years ago, a proposal was floated to hold the event in Horse Cove, but that idea was not well received by the residents of Horse Cove.

I am sure the board will

handled. First, the board would have to grant permission. The town also has an alcohol policy

that generally allows folks to bring their own alcohol to designated music events in the Park. That limited alcohol policy has worked well.


As mayor, I like the policies of no alcohol sales in Founders Park and always being open to the public; going forward, I believe we should affirm and continue these policies.

Since the Park opened over a decade ago a policy evolved not to allow ticketed events like concerts. It has worked well, although there has been a recent shift or creep toward allowing some ticketed events in Founders Park. Nevertheless, the Highlands Car Festival, the Rotary Art Shows, the Twilight 5k, the Dahlia Festival, the Farmers Market, and SnowFest are all public events requiring no entry fees to Founders Park.

My concern is that Bear Shadow would be a major, ticketed event in our public Founders Park. I have also had similar concerns about the recent Highlands Food & Wine Festival when the Truckin' and Shot at Redemption events were held in the park, where the entire Park was cordoned off, and folks without tickets, including myself, were not allowed in the Park. One resident came to my office the morning of the event complaining Truckin' staff told her she could not use the public restrooms. She was in my office because they said the mayor ordered the restroom closure. Town staff corrected the misunderstanding immediately, and the restrooms we opened to the public.

I'm sure the town board will thoroughly review the Bear Shadow request and make the best decision for the community. I am also sure that they have received a lot of feedback about the request, pros, and cons.



Money and politics

Dear Editor,

I thoroughly enjoyed Bud Katz's "Here's the Thing" column entitled, Supremely Wrong, in the Highlands Newspaper on December 5, 2024.


Most of his argument resonated with me. Special interests have come to dominate our political system. But we are human. To expect more is to expect too much. In fact, we spend a shockingly low amount on politics when viewed in the proper context.

National GDP is roughly \$30 trillion per year. The Fed Government's spending accounts for roughly 25% of annual GDP, or \$7.5 trillion. Thus, if amortized over a fouryear Presidential term, the \$16 billion spent on the 2024 campaign equates to 0.0005% of the Fed Government's spending over the Presidential term in question.

Accordingly, there may be no better ROI for the wealthy, as illustrated by the immense influence Musk acquired for \$250mm of donations to Trump. Can we blame him? After all, his companies are highly dependent on the Federal Government for subsidies.

If we want less money in politics, then we should reduce the size and scope of the Federal Government. That will reduce the ROI. If we rely on legal restrictions, the money will not simply exit politics; it will merely find other, less transparent, means to achieve the same end.


For the past 31 years Leland shared the things he loved with his other love, Joyce Tucker, of Pine Creek Community.

Investing in Highlands' future

A popular internet joke during Donald Trump's first Presidential term was related to the administration's use of "Infrastructure Week" and the fact that it never fully came to fruition during those four years.


Here on the plateau, we are facing down the prospect of our own growing need for an infrastructure related time period.

Infrastructure is one of those unpopular things to think about that isn't really considered a problem until it is a problem. A perfect example of this is the recent closure of NC 106 for repairs. It may not have been glaringly obvious how important NC 106 is as a main entryway into Highlands until it was closed, and it has created a great inconvenience for businesses, residents, and school students in Highlands and Rabun Gap School students.



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As Highlands continues to grow and change, we enjoy the fruits of our new visitors and prospective residents, but growth also places a strain on our resources. As a plateau, there is limited space

Therefore, the solution for many has been to increase our population density in order to "grow" the space that we do have.

For example, an investor chooses to buy a single-family home on 2 acres and replaces that property with six, new singlefamily homes using .33 acre lots each – though such a scenario wouldn't be allowed within the town limits without special conditional zoning. While this is an excellent way to make a profit and bring more people to Highlands, it also creates a greater strain on our water system, cell towers, road usage, garbage, schools ... you get the idea.

There is an old Greek proverb that reads, "A society grows great when old men plant trees whose shade they know they shall never sit in."

If we want to truly make Highlands (and to a larger extent, America) great, and sustain growth at the rate it is occurring, there are going to have to be investments made in the future of Highlands so that we can keep our mountain paradise that services its residents while being a place that all can enjoy.

Meanwhile, Bryson's Paving and Grading, a local company, is working feverishly to get the repairs done to give us a safe, accessible road for residents and visitors alike.




Rotarv hears about trips

the home that caught fire on Nov. 21 and had minimal damage around the chimney.

HF&R, might have to leave but as it turned out volunteer and paid staff as well as mutual aid departments handled the call.

HFR Chief Ryan Gearhart said fire crews were able to knock the fire down quickly and even though the home was inhabited, there were no injuries.

"There's some damage, but it's pretty minimal," said Gearhart. "There's a lot of charring around the fireplace itself. It started to get into the attic, but we caught it pretty quick."

He added that the fire would not have been knocked down as quickly without the assistance of other departments.

"Also, a huge thank you to our staff both paid and volunteer as well as our mutual aid departments Cashiers-Glenville FD, Rabun County station 8, Macon Co. Squad 4, Macon County EMS, and Macon county dispatchers," said Gearhart. "Great work by all involved which resulted in a great save."

Gearhart said investigators are leaning towards something catching fire in the chimney as the cause of the blaze.

Nov. 21 was a cold evening with significant winds. Gearhart said that while the fire was knocked down within 15 min., crews spent a significant amount of time making sure everything was extinguished before leaving the scene.

"We did a lot of overhaul to make sure everything was extinguished," he said. "You make that good of a save on a house, you better make sure everything is out. Especially with the wind that night. One spark and you're back there at 2 in the morning and half the house is burned down."

HFR crews had just returned from a call for a wreck on Franklin Road on Nov. 21 when the call for Upper Lake Road came in. Gearhart said they were fortunate they had just returned, as two other trucks were out on other calls.

"We were fortunate, we had several people here and made it to Upper Lake in 5-6 min.," he said.

Let's ready our hearts and minds

The word "repent" has never struck me as a very Christmasy word. Not like the words "peace," "hope," "joy," or "love," for example. But here we are in this season - Advent - preparing for Christmas. In the church, we think of Advent as a time of readving our hearts and minds for the birth of Jesus.

How do you get ready for a baby to arrive? What should you do to prepare for a little one to enter your life? If you're unsure, you can reference one of countless websites that will guide you through a pregnancy. They're chock full of information about how the baby will develop during each month or trimester, advice about what and how to feed your newborn, and what to take with you to the hospital when the time comes.

Strangely, none of these websites has any information about repentance. These days, it's just not what to expect when you're expecting.

But in the time of Jesus, there was a prophet, a messenger of God, named John the Baptist, who told anyone who would hear what to do in order to prepare for the Christ child to be born. He didn't say anything about cribs or diapers or sleep training. Instead, he told people how to prepare their hearts and minds to receive the best news the world has ever heard. Things don't have to remain the way they are. War and violence and discord don't have to be our way of life. The reign of God is coming to bring all of us peace, hope, joy, and love!

The word "repent" means to turn. To turn one's heart and mind to God. Writer and theologian Dan Clendenin explains repentance so helpfully: "Repentance doesn't mean to feel bad; it means to think differently. To repent doesn't mean to grovel in self-hatred, morbid introspection, or pious sorrow. It consists of both outward acts and an inward disposition. When you repent you turn around, change directions, choose a different path, and make a radical rupture. Repentance signals an abrupt end to life on auto-pilot or to business as usual."

In my experience, Christmastime usually brings out the best in us. Perhaps more than any other time of year, we are full of good cheer during December. For example, charitable donations peak in December. The anticipation of Christmas makes way for more generosity, more good will, more kindness. The joy of Christmas has the power to call forth a change in our spirits. It seems as though repentance (changing our hearts, turning around, stopping with the business as usual attitude) is actually a thing during this season. We just didn't know it!

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







