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# Community meetings continue to address Helene devastation

A couple of weeks after Hurricane Helene hit, nonprofit leaders, Charlotte Muir (Highlands Cashiers Health Foundation), Leslie Manning (Pisgah Legal Services), and T.J. Smith (International Friendship Center), noticed a need for a community-wide meeting to coordinate relief efforts.

Key stakeholders from across the town of Highlands were invited to be part of a conversation regarding current needs and what was being done to address those needs, both locally and regionally.

The early meetings enabled

While Highlands received significant storm damage from Helene, I am grateful to the town workers who immediately re-

sponded to the emergency. Neither I nor the Town Manager had to ask town employees to work longer than normal or go that extra mile; they responded automatically in making sure the town was back in business without delay.

I am also thankful for the businesses that stepped forward to provide any assistance they could provide. While business activity was significantly cut back after the hurricane, our shops, hotels, and restaurants were able to open soon after the storm. I hope Highlands will have the normal levels of visitors and second homeowners back in town during the end-of-the-year holiday season.

I am also glad that several infrastructure projects will be underway in the near term. The initial dredging of Mirror Lake is within days of beginning. The Dog Mountain water project is also on the verge of getting underway, with the water plant upgrades right behind. The conversion of the old fire station to the new ABC store is just around the corner, so look for the new store to open sometime in December.

I am also grateful that Highlands converted to full-time staffing at the new fire station. This past week we had a structure fire on Upper Lake Road. The full-time fire-fighters were on the scene within minutes and were able to save the home.

Now if Santa Claus can deliver a present to Highlands of NC 106 being opened by Christmas, that would be wonderful. I have my fingers crossed. I'm hopefully optimistic




This year leaves us somewhat melancholy here in Highlands and Cashiers due to Hurricane Helene that literally de-

stroyed surrounding towns leaving complete devastation in its path. It was if a rage by mother nature was unleashed causing mudslides that took homes and people and threw them in the raging river killing so many with large numbers still unaccounted for.

Some watched as everything they worked for their whole lives was washed away or if still standing homes filled with massive amounts of mud and every piece of furniture and appliances ruined. With no flood insur-

ance – something one wouldn't expect was needed in the mountains of western North Carolina -- and no money to rebuild, there are no words to describe the



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agony. Children are looking to their parents for answers and hope and there really isn't any. Some people are living in tents with heaters and blankets from strangers who donated. Where they go from here is unknown.

What I have witnessed from the Appalachian people who immediately took off to help find survivors with mules in the rural areas, rescuing stranded victims on foot because roads were destroyed, pulling bodies from the rivers, saving confused

pets displaced and alone, providing food and water to people still in shock trying to comprehend the tragedy bestowed upon them, and those begging for help in finding their loved ones shows the love and true spirit of mountain folks.

We have collected supplies, warm clothes, heaters, coats, hats, gloves and blankets, water, paper products, medical supplies, etc. and the generosity of our residents is to be applauded. Our Rotary Club has done a recent fundraiser and collected over \$54,000 on Bingo night!

It will be years before Asheville and the surrounding small towns will recover and as you sit down for a wonderful feast on Thanksgiving, I ask you all to pray for peace and understanding of this tragedy and more importantly pray for the victims who are suffering their loss of loved ones and hopefully will have food, warmth, and shelter. Their lives were shattered and will never be the same.

### What HC Hospital is thankful for ....

Dear Editor.

As our community and region recovers from Hurricane Helene, we want to share with you about the incredible work of Highlands Cashiers Hospital, HCA Healthcare, and Mission Health. As the largest employer and provider of healthcare in the region, Mission Health has remained a vital source of care and stability for the community during this challenging time.

We want to start by thanking the dedicated staff, physicians, and the support from HCA Healthcare which allowed our hospital and all of Mission Health's hospitals to stay operational throughout the storm. We also want to extend appreciation to our community partners and our government agencies who all stepped up in support. This was no small feat, and we're incredibly proud of the resilience shown by our teams. Highlands Cashiers Hospital faced multiple challenges as the storm came and we felt the aftermath of the devastation. As heavy rains and winds came, countless trees fell. This led to impassable roads and the challenges with resupplying. HCA had the foresight to stage resources, such as heavy lift helicopters and our hospital benefitted from multiple shipments to keep our patients and staff fed and supplied during the storm. We also noted a loss of phone coverage and internet. Fortunately, HCH had redundant network connectivity built that allowed some internet connectivity even as others did not. At times, community members utilized our hospital's lobby to place cell phone calls allowing them to keep I in touch with loved ones.

Our local challenges pale in comparison to what Mission Hospital in Asheville and Blue Ridge Regional Hospital in Spruce Pine faced. Despite the challenges, including the loss of municipal water, HCA Healthcare engineers quickly sprang into action. At Mission Hospital, they developed a system that allowed us to bring in more than 200,000 gallons of potable water daily by digging wells and using tanker trucks to pressurize the water into Mission Hospital, ensuring continuous and safe patient care. In Spruce Pine, they even implemented an above-ground septic system, allowing the community hospital to remain operational despite the absence of city water and sewer services. While managing through these issues, Mission Hospital alone cared for more than 3,400 patients and delivered over 70 babies in the two weeks following the hurricane. Across our clinics and community hospitals, another 5,000 patients received care in the same period.

In addition to our local teams, hundreds of HCA Healthcare colleagues from across the country traveled to Western North Carolina to provide much-needed support.

HCA Healthcare has also focused on caring for our teams, many of whom were facing their own personal struggles. Supplies were airlifted in, and mobile units were set up to provide essential services like kitchens, bathrooms, showers, and handwashing stations. We also established "markets" at 11 of our WNC facilities, offering free food, water, ice, toiletries, gasoline, and more to our colleagues and their families. The HCH team found great relief when

gas became available free at the hospital. Many dedicated hospital staff came to work with their cars on empty not knowing if they could get back home to their families. Also, many smiles were seen as hospital employees were able to find much needed groceries to include milk, eggs, and bread at the hospital's mini market.

I'm also proud to share that, in just the first two weeks following the hurricane, over \$1.6 million in emergency funding from the HCA Healthcare Hope Fund was distributed to colleagues in need. The Hope Fund is an employee-run, employee-supported 501(c)(3) charity, and it has been an essential lifeline for so many. Additionally, HCA Healthcare has contributed \$1 million toward disaster relief efforts in Western North Carolina, further demon-



### A new take on King Arthur

ver since I read Mary Stewart's King Arthur trilogy when I was in high school, I've been a King Arthur fan. I suspect "The Crystal Cave" was one of the many books I snuck into class to read between the covers of textbooks. It was followed by "The Hollow Hills" and "The Last Enchantment."



Until this year, the last King Arthur book I read was "Finding Camlann" by Sean Pidgeon. Set in modern times, it's the story of an archaeologist intrigued by new evidence discovered at Stonehenge. Like many before him, he sets out to establish whether Arthur ever actually existed.

When I learned there was a new King Arthur book out, I had to get it. Was I daunted by its nearly 700 pages? Yes, and I wondered whether it would hold my interest. That wonder disappeared in only a few pages, as I stayed up late night after night to finish it.

### The Bright Sword

by Lev Grossman

Warning: This is not your typical King Arthur story. It is set wholly in Arthur's

time but has a modern tone. If profanity bothers you, you'll want to avoid this book. If the conflict between the pagan world and Christianity will upset you, this is not the book for you. Those fairies don't mince their words.

This description from a Forbes review captures what you'll encounter in this tale featuring lesser knights of the Round Table.

"The Bright Sword" also broaches issues that are

decidedly more contemporary: abandonment and abuse, sexual and gender identity, even immigration, all in ways that feel

natural and organic rather than preachy or pedantic.

A young wannabe knight arrives at Camelot, hoping to become a knight of the Round Table. What he discovers is a small group of despondent knights sitting around the famed table. Arthur is dead, and the top tier knights are dead or departed. Forget Percival,

Galahad, and Lancelot. He finds instead, Sirs Dinadan, Constantine, Palomides, and Bedivere, plus a court fool. I recalled Bedivere and Palomides but had to look up the other two. Sure enough, they did exist in the original legend.

To restore Camelot and save England, they must reestablish Arthur's spirit and vision, and, to do that, they must "solve the mystery of why the lonely, brilliant King Arthur fell." The story turns much of the original material on its head but is all the more intriguing because it does. As the blurb says, this tale "... is steeped in tradition, complete with duels and quests, battles and tournaments, magic swords and Fisher Kings. It's also a story about imperfect men and women, full of strength and pain, trying to reforge a broken land in spite of being broken themselves."

If you're a King Arthur fan, this is a must-read. If you're a fantasy fan and know little to nothing of the legend of King Arthur, it's also a must-read. For me, one sign of a great book is that it stays in my head for days after I've finished it. This one did that and more.

Every Thanksgiving for as long as I can remember I've done the same thing—stuffed myself to the point where I feel like the turkey on display.

I don't want to seem ungrateful. Of course, I'm truly thankful for the bountiful feast set before me. I appreciate the money it took to buy it, the time it took to cook it, and the hands that lovingly prepared it. I just wish there wasn't so much of it.

When I'm confronted with overwhelming quantities of food and forced to make decisions about how much to eat, I have plenty of help. About the time I've sampled everything, and my digestive juices are flowing, my New Age nutrition voice calmly speaks up and asks: "How many different kinds of enzymes do you think it'll take to digest all this? Don't you know you shouldn't eat soand-so and so-and-so together?"

I shrink back from the table in horror. Resting my fork on my plate I remember still another tidbit from the Beverly Hills Diet: Whatever isn't digested turns to fat. As I peek beneath the tablecloth to view my swelling midsection, I'm certain it's already happening. In fact, I'm beginning to not feel so well.

My growing indigestion is interrupted by my aunt, standing over me. "Won't you have another?" she offers, holding the platter of fresh-buttered homemade rolls beneath my nose.,

"I really ca---," I start to say, then watch my hand, now disconnected from my brain, reach up and grab one. I already know she got up at 6 a.m. to make these rolls.

"Who's ready for seconds?" my uncle asks. I shake my head quietly. "What's that you say there, Betty?" he calls over his shoulder enroute to the kitchen. "Gotta eat up this food or it'll go to waste." Soon he is back,

I start waddling in the direction of the couch, then stop short to collapse on the floor instead. If I pretend to read the newspaper, maybe no one will notice if I drift off for a minute or two. There's no blood flowing to my brain—it's all down there trying to take care of the multitudes arriving in my stomach.

At least I have company. Amidst the complaints of "I think I'm going to pop" and "I can't believe I ate all that", my father says seriously, "We do this every year. Everything's so good that we overeat. Every vear we vow not to do it again ... but we do." My sentiments exactly.


At the November Town Board meeting, commissioners agreed to the following bonuses for 2024.



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

Board meeting, Parkside Partners Acquisitions, LLC made a conditional zoning request to change the B-3 commercial designation of the property at 299 Oak Street to B-1 Conditional.

"The applicant is proposing to construct eight detached single-family dwellings on the parcel," said Planning Director Michael Mathis. "According to section 8.3.1 of the UDO, the B-1 zoning district allows one residential dwelling per 2,400 square feet of lot size. The property lot size is 47,480 square feet (1.09 acres). If rezoned to B-1, based on the square footage. the UDO would allow up to 19 residential

The units bordering Oak Street will be 3-stories with elevators; the units along the creek side will have larger footprints and be one-story.

According to Parkside Partners Acquisitions the façades will resemble English cottages.

"This will be a part of the renaissance we are seeing on Oak Street," said Realtor Pat Gleeson with Christies International Real Estate.

To serve the eight residential units, the applicant is proposing to add between 28 and 30 onsite parking spaces to accommodate each townhome as well as the Oak Square property.

Mathis said Section 9.1.7 of the UDO requires two on-site parking spaces for each dwelling unit.

"Additionally, there is a deed requirement of reserving 12 parking spaces for the use and benefit of the "Oak Square" property at Oak and 3rd streets and Oak and Main streets (often referred to as The Alamo) in perpetuity on the site. Therefore, the UDO and deed requires that the project has a minimum of 28 on-site parking spaces," said Mathis.

Commissioners noted that there are only 10 parking spaces donated to Oak Square on the rendition, but Mathis said the owners of Oak Square said they only need 10 spots.

Before the Town Board can rule on a conditional zoning request, the UDO requires that the Zoning and Planning Boards review the proposal and give their recommendations. Once those are given, the Town Board can decide whether to grant the Conditional Zoning request.

Commissioners agreed to send the project on to the Zoning and Planning Boards.



With the four additional items, the total cost of the Highlands School project is just under 8.4 million dollars.

The Highlands School expansion project will expand the middle school to accommodate much needed classroom space and additional space for career and technical education courses, and an updated media center. In addition to expanding the middle school building, the project also includes renovation to the elementary wing of the school that will re-purpose two classroom spaces for Pre-K classes.

Two months ago, the board approved the funding for the actual construction of the project with a guaranteed maximum price (GMP) from Venoy Construction. At that time the GMP did not include the soft costs associated with the project. The four additional items approved by the board include these soft cost items.

Commissioner Josh Young and Danny Antoine both expressed their concerns about approving the GMP for Vanoy Construction last month but now additional funding was being requested for the project.

"We did a GMP last month which is a guaranteed maximum price, and we come this month wanting an additional \$560,845," said Young. "I really do support the project, but I just want to see this thing buttoned up a little bit better."

He said the project is an example of the board going the wrong way.

"It's not necessarily the money, I think it's the sequencing of the budget," he said.

County Finance Director Lori Carpenter assured the board the additional funding was to cover the soft costs not included in the GMP, and the board's approval of the four items would set the cap on the total cost of the project.

The four items approved at the November meeting totaled an additional \$560,845 which will be taken from the county general fund balance. The items include furniture, technology and Pre-K playground equipment; special inspections and testing fees, and an owner contingency fund.

Furniture, technology, and playground

equipment will cost \$286,545 based on the size of the building, the student population, and the needs of the classrooms.

The second item for special inspections and construction materials testing services will cost \$74,500. WSP USA Environment & Infrastructure Inc. will provide the services which are required by North Carolina for construction of education facilities. As a part of the inspections, daily test results and observations will be reported.

An additional project item approved was a change to LS3P's contract to revise the design of the structural foundations of the two-story middle school classroom addition relating to the underground storage tank at a cost of \$75,000.

Re-design of the structural foundations is necessary because the existing underground fuel storage tank will remain under the footprint of the new classroom addition. The school board and county commissioners decided to leave the 10,000-gallon underground storage tank in place with the necessary remediation requirements for soil, groundwater and decommissioning of the tank.

The final item approved the funding for Terracon Consultants, Inc. to provide environmental consulting services related to the permanent closure of the tank and the installation of a vapor intrusion mitigation system for the site at a cost of \$36,000.

Carpenter pointed out that the county will be seeing a deduct change order from Vanoy Construction GMP, because there was an allowance in the total price for the treatment of the underground storage tank so there will be a deduct in their contract directly offsetting the \$111,000.

An additional \$200,000 was also included to cover an owner contingency to cover any design or scope changes that county may make to the project.

The contingency amount was set at two and half percent of construction costs. If the money isn't used it will be put back into the county's fund balance.

### A bear was in the 'Driver's Seat'

On October 2, Highlands PD received a call from a resident on Cullasaja Drive reporting a bear in a vehicle. Officers Moore, Wright, Hudson, and Code Enforcement/Animal Control Officer Leah McCall arrived to find a bear sitting in the driver's seat of a small SUV.

"We attempted to get the bear to move to the rear of the vehicle because the only way to open the car was by using a key on the driver's door," said McCall. "The bear would not cooperate. Officer Wright attempted to break out the right rear window after receiving permission from the owner but the window would not completely break due to heavy tinting. I finally turned the key, pulled the door handle, and ran."

The bear finally decided to exit the vehicle.



# Giving glory and thanks to Jesus the true kina

Tince 1863, the American calendar has observed Thanksgiving on the final Thursday of November. And for Christians who observe the church calendar (such as Anglicans), last Sunday was Christ the King Sunday, which ends the church calendar year by observing the reign of the King of Kings. 2024 is in fact the one hundredth year observing Christ the King Sunday. A new church year is initiated this upcoming Sunday with the season of Advent (waiting for the true King).

One of this past Sunday's lectionary texts included Revelation 1 verses 5 and 6, which give us a beautiful reminder of Christ's nature: "... Jesus Christ the faithful witness, the firstborn of the dead, and the ruler of kings on earth. To him who loves us and has freed us from our sins by his blood and made us a kingdom, priests to his God and Father, to him be glory and dominion forever and ever. Amen."

First, because we are loved by Jesus the Messiah, our response to God should be simply to take him at his word and live in the light of his love. This brings God glory! We can trust God absolutely. Wherever we go, in this world or the next, in life or in death, we are never beyond the range of God's love, and for this we must give him thanks and love and trust him. What we know is that God commanded his love for us in that while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us. (Rom 5:8)

Second, ponder that Christ shed his blood for us. This was no mere demonstration. It was an effective act. It achieved something. It loosed us from our sins. In his own body, Christ bore our sins on the tree; and because he bore them, we are no longer in their grip; the least we can do is let them go! I know; that is easier said than done. There are so many of them that are so natural and easy, and seem so slight and insignificant, the common sins of everyday life, which for the most part the world does not count as sin at all. But we know them.

If our ancestry means anything at all, it means a sensitivity and sincerity of conscience. But this edge is in danger of being dulled, and if it is, we shall in large measure lose our right to a separate and distinctive existence. How do we retain it? The answer is that we remember how it was that we were freed from our sins. It was not by corruptible things such as silver and gold, but by the precious blood of Christ. Remember this and we will let go of our sins one step at a time through the power of the Holy Spirit and through our cooperation with God's grace and thereby give glory to God.

Finally, remember that Christ has made his followers "kings and priests." I remember my high school football days when I played wide receiver. My job was to make

between the Chamber of Commerce/ Visitor Center, the Town Board and the attorneys for both Macon County and Highlands, an agreement has been made and the Chamber will continue to pay \$1 a year while maintaining the building at Main and First streets.

Potential changes to the lease have been discussed for years and started when the town said it wanted the Chamber/Visitor Center to pay to maintain the public bathrooms in Town Square which costs the town around \$40,000 a year.

Commissioners reasoned that since the Chamber of Commerce has successfully directed visitors to Highlands and since the businesses in town, particularly on Main Street, don't let visitors use their bathrooms, the Chamber/Visitor Center should pay for the bathroom maintenance.

Initially, commissioners wanted the Chamber/Visitor Center to pay \$40,000 a year in rent, rather than the \$1 it currently

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


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



pays, which would have offset the bathroom maintenance expense the town now shoulders.

But since the Chamber only gets membership dues, which don't amount to enough to shoulder that expense, and since occupancy tax money can only be spent on tourist related items, the Chamber has long maintained it could neither pay that amount in rent nor use the occupancy tax money on the bathrooms.

Initially, maintaining a bath-

room – though only used by tourists for the most part – wasn't considered legal.


However, since the October Town Board meeting, the town's attorney and the county's attorney came up with a solution thereby ending the standoff between the Chamber of Commerce/Visitor Center. (The county oversees the disbursement of the occupancy tax funds and therefore is in the mix.)

The solution? A mini Visitor

Center will be erected to include the bathrooms in Town Square which means occupancy tax money can legally be used to maintain the bathrooms.

Mayor Pat Taylor explained the plan at the November Town Board meeting and said though details need to be ironed out, the problem of who should pay for and be responsible for the maintenance of the bathrooms has been solved.








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
