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# **ABC Store gave town \$83,733 in 2012**

The state of the Highlands ABC Store has been the subject of several Town Board meetings since last year – culminating this budget year with free utilities.

The reason behind the move is to offset the store's decrease in profits since it moved from the town-owned building which is now the Police Department to its bigger, more expensive space in Highlands Plaza.

At the June 20 public hearing on the budget, Commissioner Eric Pierson and Mayor David Wilkes lobbied hard for the ABC

Store's free utilities when it was questioned by citizen Slocum Howland. The store was billed 6.574.01 for utilities in 2012.

Commissioner Pierson said it's likely the effects of an ABC

# **Split vote** reveals different mindsets

Macon County still has lowest tax rate in the state

#### **By Davin Eldridge**

After narrowly approving its proposed \$47,145,470 budget for the new fiscal year. County Commissioners find themselves in a state of differing political philosophies.

June's budget vote, following numerous work sessions, contentious debates and a public hearing, resulted in a 3-2 split vote. Commission chairman Kevin Corbin, a traditional Republican, along with Commissioners Ronnie Beale, a moderate Democrat, and Jim Tate, a moderate Republican, voted in favor of the budget, while conservative Republican Commissioners Paul Higdon and Ronnie Haven cast dissenting votes.

Prior to the vote, numerous department heads, community nonprofits, and other entities which regularly receive county assistance pled with the board for renewed (and at times increased) funding, in the face of state and federal reversions. Despite the financial obstacles, the board was able to pass a budget that proposed no new tax increases, while providing adequate services at the behest of worried department heads.

Just prior to the vote, Corbin briefly commented on the split board in an official statement. He also lauded County Manager Jack Horton And Chief Financial Officer Lori Hall for their work on the 2013-14 budget. Horton and Hall, he explained, were asked to carry out the di-

rective of balancing the budget using current revenue sources without any tax increases. "That wound up being a tall order with the cuts the school system received from the State and Federal Governments," he said

To balance the budget, Horton proposed that Commissioners use the approximate \$2 Million undesignated fund balance to primarily fund non-recurring, one time purchase expenses and acquisitions. "I think this is responsible budgeting and goes along with my guiding principles as a conservative when it comes to budgeting," Corbin said in his statement. "Irresponsible budgeting is when you use your savings (or undesignated fund balance) to fund all recurring expenses. Liberal budgeting, as I will call it, is what the federal government had done in funding projects with [stimulus funds] that they did not have when many local governments and school districts used that federal money to fund recurring expenses... Ask some folks how that worked out for them."

Corbin pointed out the U.S. federal government is currently approximately \$17 trillion in debt, while the local Macon County government is "blessed" to have a balanced budget—one with a projected fund balance of \$14,200,000 for the new fiscal year. "That will be almost exactly a 30% fund balance, or enough resources to operate the county for 3.6 months," said Corbin.

But while Corbin maintained that the budget was, by nature, drafted conservatively, he acknowledged the differing conservative points of view which make up the board politically.

"I know those of us who consider themselves conservative feel that having adequate operating capital is desired over being broke like the federal government and needing to look to raise taxes," Corbin continued. "We have held the line on taxes and at the same time are doing important things like funding our school, hiring one additional SRO for our sheriff, funding the replacement of safety equipment for our deputies and EMS worker, buying new lifesaving equipment for our ambulances, funding adequate and much needed recreation space, and much more. We are doing so with no tax increases and at the same time making sure the citizens of Macon County have adequate-but not excessive-services," Corbin said.

To make this happen, Corbin explained that the County, at the behest of Commissioner Jim Tate, has refinanced most of the county's debt at "substantially lower rates." In each case, Corbin commented, interest rates were lowered

through modification "with little or no cost to the taxpayer", which yielded savings of roughly \$2.5 million. "We commend Commissioner Tate for his vision and for Lori Hall for making it a reality. We have been successful in shifting expense in interest to banks to investment in schools, recreation, law enforcement, EMS, and other needed services."

Corbin boasted that Macon County continues to have the lowest tax rate in North Carolina, at 27.9 cents per \$100 valuation, citing a NC Department of Revenue tax rate figures, which calculated the effective tax rates of all 100 North Carolina counties as a factor of actual sales versus valuation. "These calculations place us as the forth lowest effective tax rate in the state of North Carolina," said Corbin. "Carteret County was at 31.71, Swain County at 31.86, Watauga County at 31.93, and coming in fourth from the lowest effective tax rate in the state—Macon, at 33.58."

With such figures in mind, Corbin urged his fellow commissioners to pass the budget ordinance unanimously. "It is conservative and responsible for the citizens of our county. To vote for it is to vote for the services provided. To vote against it will be to vote against the school budget, the sheriff's budget, The EMS budget, etc... You cannot vote against it and claim to be in support of these services," he said. "You must also vote to pay for it. I hope each of you will support the budget as presented tonight."

But Macon's newly adopted budget is not conservative enough, according to Commissioners like Ron Haven or Paul Higdon, who professed their belief that they "vote their conscience."



"In my opinion we have three democrats on our board of commissioners," said Haven. "I don't care how they are registered. If you believe you're a conservative, and you're wasting taxpayer money, I won't agree that you're a republican or a conservative... I try to uphold conservative ideals.'

Haven maintains that, while in the end he voted to provide increased services, many expenditures could have been kept to a minimum.

"My opinion is that spending got out of hand last year, and other members aren't being as responsible with tax money as they could be.'

Commissioner Ron Beale voted in-step with Corbin, and pushed for increased public health services, according to official minutes.

"The board has definitely changed a lot," said Beale who in his second term has seen eight commissioners come and go. "I think that my colleagues all view government spending differently. Needs will always continue to increase and be you a conservative or a moderate, we have to always consider that. Bit I believe this board can work together as we did with this budget."

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

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
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## A bridge too far?

es. When you are the youngest of four people in a household, it takes a certain amount of stubbornness not to go with the flow. My parents and brother were all keen tennis players, and when they weren't playing tennis, they were playing bridge. A lackluster tennis player at best, I nonetheless gave it a valiant effort, but as for card games, I felt that bridge was really a bridge too far.

Bridge nights had been fun at our house when I was growing up. Daddy set up our three bridge tables in the living room. My iob was to dress the tables from our collection of tablecloths with matching napkins. We had an assortment of playing cards many souvenirs from ocean liners or international flights. Scoring pads were put out; tiny pencils were sharpened in the pantry. The finishing touch was filling up small glass dishes with pastel mints. This was a treat for us, because we were seldom allowed to eat candy, except on bridge nights. The same was true for sodas – normally a family "no-no", my parents would bring out big bottles of 7-Up and Canada Dry ginger ale for those special evenings.

Eric and I would greet the arriving bridge players at the door - taking coats, gloves, and scarves in cold weather. My parents' friends were mostly a combination of Daddy's GE colleagues, and the parents of our classmates. My folks claimed that there were households where you never saw the kids; they stayed in their rooms the whole time, ignoring the adults. It was a treat for us to have guests - to have them ask about school and hobbies, to be told how grownup we were getting. We would never have thought of having adults in the house without coming to say "hi". In a way, these kind people were like the aunts and uncles we never got to see because our own real family lived too far away. Having met all the

visitors, we stole a few candies, and snuck off back to our bedrooms to do homework, sodas in hand. I'll never forget drifting off to sleep to the sound of adult voices, often laughing, sometimes frustrated, calling out "no trump" to the tune of clinking cocktail glasses. I thought bridge was a magical, grown-up ritual, full of secret rules and codes, which I would learn one day. Can you imagine? Sometimes they

even called someone the "dummy"! How cool was that?

In Key West, my parents had learned to play bridge, along with other card games like pinochle and canasta. Somehow, I never wound up in a group of people who played bridge, and then, like driving, it seemed almost mortifying to admit I didn't know how. John played at Yale, a fact that stunned me. When I was in college, I didn't have time to eat and sleep, much less play cards. When I came to Highlands, it seemed this might be the place where I would finally learn to play bridge. Like many things in life, it wasn't that easy.

I had gone to an Open House held by neighbors. Most of the people there were nodding acquaintances, with a few strangers thrown in for good measure. One of these was a tall, strikingly handsome middle-aged woman. We began to chat, and found that we had many things in common, a European background and travel among them. I was delighted to make her acquaintance, pleased that, in her, I'd found someone with whom I could talk about things that might get you branded a snob in a small town. And with that, she turned on her heels, and strode away, never giving me so much as a backward glance. I

renew its lease at \$1 a year for 10 more years so it could expand. The plan was to use the downstairs for office and storage and to expand the upstairs for more product.

At that time, the Town Board told the ABC Board that its five-year plan for expansion of Town Hall included the use of the current ABC building and that the ABC Board should begin looking for a new location.

At that point, commissioners gave the ABC Board the "verbal" OK to withhold Local profit proceeds earmarked for the town so it could prepare for its future needs.

During fiscal year 2008-'09 a resolution was signed allowing for the continued withholding of its Local Distribution Funds.

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# Health Matters

## Making the tummy flat

ould you or do you know someone who would like a flatter tummy and thinner waist? Abdominoplasty (Tummy Tuck) helps do this by removing excess fat and skin from the tummy area and tightening the stomach muscles. The best candidates are of normal weight and in good physical condition with localized fat and loose skin that have not responded well to diet and exercise. Abdominoplasty is especially useful if the skin and muscles stretched from pregnancy or previous weight. Ideally, females should not plan on having any further children.

When I first started doing tummy tucks, it was the only procedure available to rejuvenate the abdomen. Therefore, we did them for excess fat as well as for excess skin. After the introduction of liposuction, however, indications changed to generally just excess skin, which was almost exclusively following pregnancy. However, particularly over the last 10 or 15 years, the most common reason for doing a tummy tuck is significant excess skin remaining after weight loss. Today we not only see people who have lost significant weight from diet and exercise, but also those who have undergone surgical procedures for weight loss.

The procedure consists of removing essentially all the fat and skin from below the umbilicus, stretching the skin and fat from above the umbilicus to cover the entire abdomen, and relocating a modified belly button to its proper location. While doing this, the underlying muscle is tightened to cinch the waist and also flatten the tummy. Additionally, localized areas of fat, either in the flanks or centrally in the abdomen, can be modified, usually using liposuction as an adjunct. Although the scar is relatively long and stretches

from hip to hip, it can be modified so that it will hide under a very skimpy bikini or a French-cut swim suit and there are techniques make it almost invisible.

Surgery takes approximately three to four hours, using genand can be done as

an outpatient or with an overnight hospital stay. Recovery time ranges from two weeks to a month or longer. The reason recovery takes as long as it does is because we put the skin together so tightly. We have found that if we simply remove what comes off easily and allow for simple closure in a flat position, the skin stretches back and you have loose skin again in about six months to a year. By bending the table to flex the waist and putting the tissues together exceptionally tightly, you will still be tight at a year and longer. The down side of this is that you walk around somewhat bent over for about a week, as it takes about that long for the tissues to stretch and for you to straighten totally. Although most discomfort from the surgery itself is gone in several days, until you are able to stand up straight it is the back that bothers you the most. With a balanced






#### HCCMF's 'Salon at Six' treat for the senses

He followed that with five re-created musicals at the Goodspeed Opera House. His first play, "Driving Miss Daisy" opened at Playwrights Horizons Theatre in New York in 1987. It moved subsequently to the John Houseman Theatre where it ran for three years and won the Pulitzer Prize in 1988. The film ver-



1990. The film also won the Best Picture Award. His next play, "The Last Night of Ballyhoo," was commissioned by the Cultural Olympiad for the 1996 Atlanta Olympics. It opened on Broadway the next year where it ran for over 500 performances and won Uhry the Outer Critics Circle Award, the Drama League Award and the 1997 Tony Award for

The Dappled Grays was founded by Mandolinist Michael Smith and guitarist Casey Cook in 1999 as an outlet for performing original instrumental music.





# Bring others to the faith through prayer and good works





was raised Catholic, I think the term is cradle Catholic. In a Catholic home it was not difficult to follow God's call. Maybe I did it out of obedience to my parents. There was not much keeping me from being Catholic, not much opposition to the practice of our faith. Indeed there were many things we did that reinforced our faith, like the celebration of religious holidays. Families were not divided by the practice of the faith. Those who have joined the faith later in life sometimes did it a great peril and perhaps alienation from their families. At times, they seem to be the best Christians, having given up so much to follow the Lord's call.

It is like the culture of the time of Jesus. Parents turned away from their children and children from their parents over religion. The first people who heard the gospel of Jesus Christ found it very difficult and even had to risk their lives to practice their Christianity. And perhaps we are returning to days like these. Religious freedom is compromised by laws, so many families no longer worship together as children are swept up by popular culture. Our worship each week is seen as without value or perhaps just insurance against eternal damnation. Lost is the sense of worshiping God as a community. It is just putting in time. This is not the wholehearted response God wants.

Jesus spoke about how complete our response to God must be. Now Jesus sounds demanding, even cruel, as he asks the man to abandon the burial of his father and instead follow him. Now there is nothing wrong with burying the dead – we call it a corporal work of mercy. Even the commandment tells us to honor our father and mother. What Jesus must be referring to is any excuse that would keep us from following him. Following Jesus must be first; the burial can be done only as something secondary. Nothing, not even family, is a valid excuse for not following the Lord. Singleness of purpose and priority in following God is essential.

But our zeal for the kingdom of God is not to go overboard. Though we are our brother's keeper, we are not to force anyone to join us in our faith or worse yet do what the disciples wanted to do when they were rejected by the Samaritans. They wanted to call down fire from heaven to destroy them. They are ultimately answerable for their own choice and there is no way to know if that is their final choice. As Christians we want all to be saved. What Jesus is saying is leave them to the patience of God.

So, we follow Jesus without hesitation or delay. We should never count the cost, but instead be thankful that we have been called to follow the Lord. In that context, may we employ our religious freedom to follow God's call freely and bring others to the faith not by forcing but through our prayer and good works.

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

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

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
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
