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A live Christmas tree or a cut tree? That is the question

The town's final budget worksession for the 2016-'17 budget was last Thursday and the budget will be presented at tonight's Town Board meeting.

Most everything discussed and agreed upon at the second budget worksession on May 12 was solidified last Thursday but there was much discussion about the upcoming Christmas festivities in K-H Founders Park and the problem of bears getting into dumpsters - those that are bear proof and those that aren't. Christmas Tree

Though commissioners agreed to allocate \$30,000 for new Christmas decorations and lights saving the current version of both are awful - it was the \$20,000 allocated for a live 30-ft. Christmas tree that caused the most stir.

"The \$20.000 is for the tree and that gets it here," said Town Manager Bob Frye. "The rest is for

Teacher John deVille goes to Washington

A dozen civics, history and social studies teachers traveled to Washington, D.C., last week to lobby the U.S. Senate to move forward with the process of appointing Judge Garland to the United States Supreme Court.

President Barack Obama nominated Garland two months ago, but the U.S. Senate has not taken any action on the nomination and all indications are that they won't until a new President is elected. Garland has served on the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit, the nation's second most important court, for 19 years. He's been the court's chief judge the last three vears.

The 12 teachers who were invited to the White House last week included Franklin High School U.S. History Teacher and former Highlander John deVille

Governor's aide outlines his plans for state Attendees voice concern over 'Bathroom Bill'

The Cashiers Area Chamber of Commerce hosted April Riddle, the senior aide to Governor Pat McCrory, on Thursday, May 19, 2016, to give the Governor an opportunity to share his plans for North Carolina regarding the economy, education, roads, and how the Bathroom Bill will affect North Carolina this tourist season.

Economy

April Riddle, in her discussion of North Carolina's financial state, announced that North Carolina is, "the fastest growing economy in the nation."

She spoke of the Governor's creation of 280,000 jobs in North Carolina. North Carolina

About tonight's Town Board agenda

onight's Highlands Town Board meeting has a full agenda. As always we will meet at the Conference Center at 7 pm.

The first item on the agenda will be a public hearing for a zoning change to the property next to the Old Helen's Barn. The request is for a new hotel on the site.

A major item will be the presentation of the town budget for FYI 2016/'17. A public hear-

ing for the adoption of the budget will be set for the June board meeting. The proposed budget totals \$14.5 million That figure includes all operations of town government including the enterprise utility funds.

There will be no ad valorem tax increase in the budget, although there are rate increases in water, sewer and sanitation. Water will go up \$3 per month and sewer and sanitation will be up \$1.50 each. The town has not increased rates on these utilities for several years, yet operating costs have risen. Auditors and regulators require the town to operate these utility

services deficit free. Without rate increases these departments fall in the red this coming year.

Also, in water and sewer we are facing major capital expenditures. The new bleach system at the water plant will cost \$580,000, and the new screening system for the sewer plant will be \$135,000. In addition, we will spend this coming year \$102,000 for the design and engineering services for the replacement of the Buck Horn Water tank. The actual con-

struction of the tank is scheduled for the following year and will be around a half million dollars. I know some folks will criticize the increased rates. I believe the town should address these small increases now. rather than delay and face huge increases down the road, like was done several years ago with a 22% electrical rate increase.

Our reserves will remain strong for the coming year with both the general fund reserves and the enterprise reserves at around 30% each. The town has redirected \$320,000 in electric reserve funds to expand Altitude Broadband. We take this utility service to the next level of operation in 2017 by expanding the fiber network. This expenditure is a loan that will be repaid.

The board will also review town park policies that have been in draft form for a number of months. The policies will address banners, signage and the use of Founders Park.

US Cellular will present a final draft of its proposed cell tower contract. The tower is to be located next to the fire station. I have received feedback that some believe the town gave US Cellular special consideration by locating on town property. To set the record straight, US Cellular deployed their engineers around town and decided what was the best location for the tower. They made a proposal to build it next to the fire station. The town would have considered proposals by other cell phone providers. US Cellular made the first and only one. They will be investing over \$200,000 to locate their equipment on the tower that Highlands will own. It is a winning investment for both US Cellular, and Highlands.



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
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Puchacz earns BA from UNC-Charlotte

is also projected to reduce taxes by 4.4 billion dollars. This reduction has moved North Carolina's business tax climate from 44th in the nation to 15th in the nation. North Carolina's income tax is set at 5.499%. This is lower than both Georgia and South Carolina.

McCrory also plans to set up new programs that will allow veterans to be trained for the work force, to decrease the amount of unemployed veterans in North Carolina.

Bathroom Bill

The Question and Comment portion of the event was dominated by concern over the HB2 dubbed "The Bathroom Bill." This bill has created numerous boycotts of North Carolina products and events which has affected the tourist industry in the state.

The audience expressed concerns saying losses are expected to be large during the upcoming tourist season.

Jack Austin, general manager of Old Edwards Hospitality Group, which has made Highlands a wedding destination over the last decade, expressed concern about the potential loss of revenue to the local economy.

"We welcome all weddings, even same sex weddings and with this bill we could easily lose that business which would be a loss to us but would mean a loss of tens of thousands of dollars to the local economy. This isn't just about losing a Bruce Springstein concert in Greenville, it's about a local merchant or restauranteur losing, too. The economic impact is not good. We don't want to discourage any kind of wedding."

Austin went on to say that regardless of how individuals might feel, the people who are visiting this part of the state – Highlands and Cashiers -- feel differently.

"They come from big cities, they're a younger clientele, and they've got more progressive attitudes."

HB2 passed within 12 hours of being filed and, was, in Austin's opinion, "not well thought out," he said.

Some members of the audience actually said Governor McCrory ought to repeal the bill and apologize.

Education

While there has been some controversy over Governor McCrory's stance on education, Riddle discussed what the Governor hopes to improve – for one, McCrory plans to raise the average teacher salary to \$55,000.


Linda Quick, board member of Summit Charter School, immediately disputed this statement declaring that as a result of the small budget granted by the state, the school is forced "to go back to the community and raise the money so that we can keep the Governor's promise," she said.

While Riddle had no response to this concern, she did announce that there has been a 50% increase in charter school enrollment — likely due to the huge increase in charter and private school vouchers.

Riddle then discussed how North Carolina's education is improving. The Fourth Grade reading scores are increasing, which the Governor feels is helping contribute to the increase in graduation rate, which is now at 85%. According to Riddle, the Governor has also invested 980 million dollars in the advancement of North Carolina's university system. There will also be an opening of a new branch of Western North Carolina University's School of Science and Math in the old Broughton Hospital building in order to make the campus more available to students who live in remote areas.







and the group shared the same sentiment – that it's hard to teach students the procedures and roles of government when the Senators are currently ignoring their responsibilities.

DeVille and the other educators attended a mock hearing held by Democrats on the Senate Judiciary Committee to demonstrate the importance of having the full complement of nine justices on the Supreme Court.

"Most striking to me was the testimony of Judge Timothy Lewis. He made a point of informing the committee that even though he had had strong disagreements with Judge, and now Justice Samuel Alito, that he, Lewis, had testified on his behalf during his confirmation hearings because he deserved to be confirmed because (a) that was President Bush's choice and (b) he was eminently qualified," said deVille.

The educators also met with President Obama's senior adviser Valerie Jarrett at the White House.

"It's not only about Judge Garland," Jarrett said. "It's about the future of our country and making sure our students have a system they can trust and eventually lead. Your coming here, speaking out and being engaged gives your students a role model to whom they can aspire. That's important at a time when so many people have become disillusioned with our government."

Jarrett asked the group for specific examples of ways the situation with Judge Garland has impacted what they have taught in the classroom.

DeVille said that just last Monday he taught a lesson on the issue and asked his students to develop pros and cons for both having the hearings and delaying the hearings. He said in the three classes he taught the lesson, all students developed both advantages and disadvantages to delaying the hearings but overall, the students agreed that politics should be kept out of the decision and the hearings should be held for Judge Garland.

Jarrett encouraged the group of educators to use the current situation with the U.S. Supreme Court appointments as a teachable moment for students and said to use it as a way to encourage them to get involved in the process.



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

the decorations and lighting."

Commissioner John Dotson contested the allocation saying "We could buy one for \$5,000 every year."

He pointed out that there were lots of trees at Christmas tree farms that are too big to sell which the owners would probably like to get rid of.

"I know they are waiting for the White House to call but that's just not going to happen," he said.

But a live tree has long been in the plans for K-H Founders Park and Commissioner Brian Stiehler said though he agreed allocating \$20,000 for a tree was a lot of money, he would like a live tree.

He said a live tree would mean a 90inch root ball and he was sure that he could find one here in Highlands, one a property owner might like to get rid of, especially if his or her name was associated with the tree in the park.

Mayor Pat Taylor reminded the board that erecting a cut tree each year would mean constructing a concrete pad and involve guy wires – probably not the look or feel the Founders Park Coalition was thinking of when it planned a Christmas tree for the park.

For budgeting purpose the \$50,000 was left in the Rec Park budget for 2016-'17 but it could change.

Dumpsters

For a few years now, the town has allocated \$30,000 a year to replace old, rusted and weak dumpsters with bear proof dumpsters and bear proof lids.

The trouble is they don't always keep bears out. Why? Because of people said Mayor Taylor.

"We are getting a lot of complaints about garbage in the streets so maybe we need to consider a punitive approach," he said.

According to Town Manager Frye, the problem is the dumpsters aren't being secured properly. "They're not being used correctly," he said. "By not doing anything about it we are rewarding inappropriate behavior. We can put bear proof lids on every dumpster in town, but if they aren't being used properly then they won't work."

Nothing monetarily was decided upon concerning dumpsters and their use, but the issue isn't dead.

Utility Increases

Commissioners also discussed the increase in the minimum charge for water, sewer and garbage pickup.

All three are enterprise funds, which means they are supposed to be self-sustaining with all expenses paid for with each respective fund. That hasn't been the case – capital expenses have been typically paid out of the General Fund Balance or the Electric Fund Balance.

The minimum monthly charge for water will go up \$3 from \$32 a month to \$35; sewer will go up \$1.50 from \$32 to \$33.50; and garbage pick-up with go up \$1.50 from \$18.50 to \$20 per month. This will put the funds, which are currently in the red in the black, but just barely.

Commissioner Amy Patterson wondered if the increase was enough given that the funds are supposed to be self-sustainable and oil, fuel and tipping prices at the dump are likely to increase at some point.

"Instead of dribble drabs each year, should we consider more? We'll be ahead for now, but for how long – the departments are supposed to pay for themselves," she said.

But Commissioner Dotson said he preferred assessing financial needs in the enterprise departments each year. "This shows taxpayers we are reassessing each year and not just taking the money," he said.

Balancing the Budget

Budget expenditures for 2016-'17 are more than revenues even though scores of items didn't make the final budget. Expenditures are estimated to be \$14,520,640 and to-

am writing this article from scratch. I don't have an outline. I don't know exactly where I'm going. I'm not sure where I will wind up. His heart is tender and great. He will always listen. He always keeps the big picture in mind. He always remembers our frame that we are like dust. He always treats us with grace. That's the idea!

Every church I know of has people with stormy, troubled hearts. You can help calm the waters. Slow down. Listen between the lines. Be a healer. Be available to Jesus. Through you He will always listen.

tal revenues are expected to be \$13,387.536 which leaves a deficit of \$1,113,104.

Since by law the budget has to balance, \$37. 980 will be allocated from the General Fund Balance which leaves it with \$2 million and \$200,000 will be allocated from the Water Fund. In addition, \$875,124 will come from the Electric Fund. That will leave the Electrical Reserve Fund with \$2.2 million.

Despite the subtraction of funds, the town's Fund Balance is at a healthy 30%.

After its presentation tonight, a public hearing will be set for the June 18 Town Board meeting prior to adoption. The new fiscal year begins July 1.

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Methamphetamine trafficker sentenced to 12.5 years in prison

ASHEVILLE, N.C. - Joel Elias Gonzalez, 53, formerly of Franklin, N.C. was sentenced vesterday to 151 months in prison followed by five years of supervised release for trafficking large quantities of crystal methamphetamine, announced Jill Westmoreland Rose, U.S. Attorney for the Western District of North Carolina. Gonzalez pleaded guilty in February 2016 to one count of distribution of methamphetamine.

U.S. Attorney Rose is joined in making today's announcement by Daniel R. Salter, Special Agent in Charge of the Atlanta Field Division of the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), which oversees the Charlotte District Office; C.J. Hyman, Special Agent in Charge of the U.S. Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF), Charlotte Field Division; Sheriff Robert L. Holland of the Macon County Sheriff's Office; and Sheriff Chip Hall of the Jackson County Sheriff's Office.

According to filed court documents and statements made in court, from in or about June of 2015, Gonzalez was responsible for trafficking large amounts of crystal methamphetamine (crystal meth) in the Franklin, N.C. area and the Rabun County, Georgia area. Court records indicate that Gonzalez purchased the crystal meth from a source of supply in and around Atlanta, Georgia. According to court records, Gonzalez was responsible for trafficking approximately 1.3 kilograms of crystal meth.

Gonzalez is in federal custody and will be transferred to custody of the Bureau of Prisons upon designation of a federal facility. Federal sentences are served without the possibility of parole. In making today's announcement, U.S. Attorney Rose noted that multiple agencies worked together to bring this prolific crystal methamphetamine trafficker to justice and thanked the DEA, the ATF, the Macon County Sheriff's Office, the Jackson County's Sheriff's Office for investigating this case.

Assistant United States Attorney Thomas Kent of the U.S. Attorney's Office in Asheville handled the prosecution.

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

said that, "efficiency is something very close to the Governor's heart" and in that regard noted North Carolina's Department of Motor Vehicles' improvement: specifically, the ability to access the DMV online.

Another advancement in transportation would be a merit system the Governor plans to use in order to decide which areas receive new roads. This system will allow the roads that need the most improvement to be repaired, as opposed to, "the areas with the most political power having the best roads," she said.

Attendees did express concern about the lack of snow removal on secondary roads. This creates dangerous conditions for commuters and school buses, they said. Riddle said she would convey concerns about clearing the secondary roads to the Governor. Riddle said the Governor plans to also make bridge safety a priority, especially in Western North Carolina. Currently, Bonner Bridge is seeing the effects of this push, because it is currently being renovated.

Riddle intends to take the comments made by the community back to Governor McCrory for consideration. He is seeking re-election this November.


