## NC Schools scramble to comply with House Bill 13

House of Representative Kevin Corbin, along with members of the education committee have been working this week to come up with a solution to a state mandate that has left school districts across the state scrambling to prepare for the 2018-'19 school vear.

In 2016, the General Assembly passed legislation requiring smaller class sizes for kindergarten through third-grade. The mandate was made by the General Assembly, but didn't include any additional funding for teachers and classroom space. Without additional funding, school districts across the state began devising ways to come into compliance

## The many 'positives' about broadband

ighlanders were probably excited back in the early 1900s when the first telephone lines were installed. Even more in 1929 with the construction of the Lake Sequoyah Dam and power plant, not to mention the new running water system and the recently completed Gorge Road.

I took a friend down to the old power plant below the dam last week. It had beautiful mason-

ry work, and the equipment was state-ofthe-art for that time. Some parts of rural western Carolina didn't have these utilities, like telephones, until after World War II.

Like the rest of the country, Highlands is about to see another wave of life-changing technologies. Well, I may be exaggerating since urban areas already have them.

So much of the delivery of these technologies will be connected to a fiber optic broadband network that we are about to build. Our focus will be to deliver a smart grid for efficient, green utilities management. Our private partner will provide internet and video services.

Our staff is already researching applications for the "smart grid" fiber network.



Highlands Mayor Patrick Taylor For instance, in severe winters, frozen pipes become problems, especially for seasonal homeowners. Broken pipes generate copious amounts of water that flood homes causing major damage and soaring water bills. But, what if water meters were connected to a smart grid, and residents, regardless of their location, could monitor their water usage constantly? Using a cellphone AP, homeowners could check meters routinely during win-

ter months. A sudden spike would indicate a major leak in their system. The town could be contacted to shut-off the street meter, and the resident could summon a plumber.

Customers could also monitor electricity consumption daily during peak winter demand. A homeowner could monitor kilowatt usage while operating appliances, like electric heaters, to get a true picture of operating costs.

The town already employs similar technologies. Our water tanks are networked, and the staff receive real-time data concerning water levels in each tank. A smart grid will enhance this kind of monitoring.

Our staff is also researching drone technology. No not as a spy system, but for helpful applications. Some drones can do threedimensional mapping. This mapping option, coupled with infrared technology, can document the ratio of pervious to imperious surfaces in the town. There is a concern about the growing amount of impervious surface, and its environmental impact. The drone **See MAYOR page 7**




#### HS Basketball season is wrapping up...Middle School is Tri-State Champs!

could also fly over a house during winter and document heat loss from windows, roofs and walls. The infrared system could help first-responders in fire events and also to locate people lost in wooded areas.

I won't even begin to discuss German and Chinese research in developing automated helicopter taxis. They are about a decade away. Nevertheless, I do have concerns about the use of artificial intelligence and privacy rights related to future technologies.

What I have described might not have the same impact of those past technologies, but they will certainly make a difference in the lives of current and future Highlanders.

local candidate to announce her bid for reelection and released a statement at the end of 2017 declaring her intent to run again this fall.

• NC Senator District 50. This is a two-year term and is currently held by Jim Davis, re-elected in 2016.

• NC House of Representatives District 120. This is a two-year term and is currently held by Kevin Corbin, elected in 2016.

Both Senator Jim Davis and House of Representative Kevin Corbin plan to file for re-election when they return from Raleigh. The General Assembly is currently in session so both representatives will be out of town when filing opens but will file as soon as they return home.

• Macon County Commissioner District 1. This is a four-year term and is currently held by Jim Tate, elected in 2014.

• Two seats for Macon County Commissioner District 2. These are four-year terms. One seat is currently held by Ronnie Beale, re-elected in 2014, and the other seat is held by Gary Shields, elected in 2014.

All three incumbents, Jim Tate, Ronnie Beale, and Gary Shields plan to seek re-election. • Sheriff. This is a four-year term and is currently held by Robbie Holland, re-elected in 2014. Holland plans to run for another four-year term this year.

• Register of Deeds. This is a four-year term and is currently held by Todd Raby, reelected in 2014.

• Clerk of Superior Court. This is a four-year term and is currently held by Vic Perry, re-elected in 2014.

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#### Spiritually Speaking. Repentance

"But unless you repent, you too will all perish. "Our Lord and his apostles preached this great doctrine regularly. They declared, "God now commands all men everywhere to repent."

here is no beating around the bush here. You need to confess your sins and turn from them.

Someone might ask what is repentance? The answer is; it the grace of God. It is the abasement and humiliation of a man. It is grace that enables him to see himself before God as God sees him. It makes him aware of his sinful nature, his dead heart and self-centeredness. It draws him to the feet of his Savior where he is cleansed and forgiven because of his Savior's sacrifice.

Sin always produces in the hearts of those coming to repentance a bitterness of grief and a sense of regret. It causes a recognition of the depth of pain caused by forsaking your God.

But, remember, repentance is grace and wherever grace abounds so is found an indescribable sweetness which can only be understood by experience. Only when bitterness and sweetness come together in the heart as confession is made and repentance granted can the preciousness of peace be possessed.

God says through the prophet, Isaiah 57:15 "For this is what the high and lofty One says- he who lives forever, whose name is holy: I live in a high and holy place, but also with him who is contrite and lowly and to revive the heart of the contrite." But how can we know one is contrite and lowly? He must be one who truly knows the evil of sin because he has felt it. He must recognize the holiness of God's character. He must feel the spirituality of his law, for he has seen it. He knows his heart has changed because his desires have changed. He no longer judges himself by man's standard but God's standard. He hears no exaltation of himself but only praise of his Savior. He feels ever so keenly the condemnation his sins deserve but knows that condemnation is no longer on his back. He ever searches his heart and the motives of his actions because he knows the weakness of his flesh. He works to bring glory to his God and accepts no applause for his efforts because he knows it is grace alone that drives him. When others praise him for his efforts he retires to his closet in sackcloth and ashes to seek divine help to fight off his pride.

Repentance is far more than just turning from sin. It is also turning to Jesus Christ and seeking with all your heart to imitate him and show love to your God and to others. Nothing makes our Lord more pleased than we acknowledge our weakness and inability to be what he has called us to be. That we come to him stripped of pride and completely aware of our total dependence on him for all things. My dear friend, to know God and his reconciling love, to know how tender and loving he truly is, and how he heals each and every hurt of the soul, your spirit must be wounded and your heart broken. My prayer is that as you read this you will think of your own life and how short it falls of God's holiness and you will be so convicted you will fall to your knees and confess before your God and ask his forgiveness. He will hear and will forgive your sins and bless you with his grace and mercy beyond what you could ever imagine.

with the law.

To meet the unfunded mandate, districts are having to expand class sizes in higher grades, and reduce offerings of enhancement courses such as art, physical education, music, and technology.

Districts across the state are opposed to the legislation and Rep. Corbin was one of the primary sponsors of House Bill 13, which delayed the implementation of the classroom requirement last year.

Now heading into the 2018-'19 school, districts are once again faced with the issue of ensuring class sizes meet state requirements when additional teachers and classroom space, without financial help.

To comply with the state mandate this fall, local school districts would need to hire upwards of 4,750 teachers statewide, costing \$300 million.

Corbin said that he and his colleagues have been working this week to establish a compromise bill that would eventually decrease class sizes, which Corbin said everyone supports, but does so in a way that provides the needed funding to hire additional teachers or build new facilities. He believes he and his fellow Republicans are close to developing legislation that will do just that.

"I don't think there is anyone in the House or Senate that would argue that smaller class sizes aren't a good idea," said Corbin. "It has even been proven to work. But in reality, children don't come in perfect packages of 18 or 20, especially in Macon County."

In the meantime, Corbin said the General Assembly needs to act now so school districts aren't facing budget crunches this fall. Best case scenario, Corbin said he would like to see school districts have the flexibility to exceed the 18-student class size requirements when needed for the next few years so state leaders can provide proper funding to implement class reduction.

With the General Assembly set to adjourn next Friday until May, a resolution is needed in the next few days so districts can properly develop the coming year's budget.

Mission Health has been exploring land options in Macon County and surrounding areas for a very long time with a goal of identifying a location for the Mountain Area Medical Airlift (MAMA II) helicopter that can improve its ability to support patients more effectively.

"Currently, the location for MAMA II at Angel Medical Center sits below the fog line and as a result, the helicopter is unable to fly as much as 40 percent of the time because of unsafe weather, including fog, clouds and storms," reads the release. "Morning fog and summer afternoon storms are common around Angel Medical Center."

Currently, Mission says it doesn't have a new site in mind, and are still exploring options.

"Our focus has been and will always remain to ensure that we provide the community with the safest and most reliable emergency medical transport options, with improved transport times and increased ability to provide critical care transport via MAMA II when air transport is needed," they said.

As to a timeline, Mission was not forthcoming. It's unknown if this will happen before its new hospital is built or after.
