financed this year based on projected revenues across enterprise funds and from property and sales taxes. Thanks to the property valu-

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Corbin and Davis differ when it comes to NC's redistricting process

Two bills have been introduced into the North Carolina House of Representatives addressing the ongoing controversy of redistricting in the state.

and approve General Assembly

The House and Senate revise

and congressional districts based on population changes from the census. For generations, majority parties have pushed through maps favoring their sides, a practice often called gerrymandering.

Celebrate pre-Earth Day by picking up litter

A aturday is the annual Highlands Plateau Cleanup. Volunteers will be picking up litter on the Gorge Road, NC 28 and NC 106 and US 64 between Highlands and Cashiers. I also encourage folks to pick up on any streets or neighborhoods in town.

Volunteers will meet at Founders Park at 8:30a for a light breakfast and to get equipment and instructions before hitting the road around 9a. Please be sure to

call the Highlands Chamber of Commerce at 526-2112 and let them know you will be volunteering. That call helps the staff develop plans and assignments.

Volunteers will return to the park at noon to enjoy a picnic lunch. It is always a good time for community fellowship and to celebrate the collection of massive amounts of litter.

If someone wants to avoid the highways and simply collect litter around town, there will be two options. First, folks can bring bags of trash to the Highlands Conference Center next to the ball field and deposit them in a large dumpster, or they can bring the bags to Founders Park where there will be another large dumpster on Pine Street. Also, if bags of litter are left

on the side of the road, please give me a call at (828) 506-3138, and I will come out with my truck to collect the bags. Last year I drove all the way to the Jackson County line collecting bags.

Everyone is encouraged to participate at this pre Earth Day event. The cleanup is a great way to celebrate Monday's official Earth Day.

TaylorTonight is the April HighlandsTown Board meeting at the Highlandslands Community Building next to the ball

field. It starts at 7p with public comment. The board will review proposed chang-

es to the leash ordinance. At the last meeting I proposed extending the leash requirement to all residential areas. My proposal also permitted dogs to be off leash so long as owners had their animal under voice command control. The public safety committee and staff have developed a new proposal that I believe addresses safety concerns and is not too restrictive.

The first town budget workshop was held last Thursday. The Town Manager presented a list of capital needs that were over 3.4 million dollars. Some items were printed in red indicating they are subject to not being funded this year if there are budget constraints. Topping this red list were several road projects that could be postponed another year. By comparison other road projects, such as a section of Cullasaja Road, can't be delayed. The heavy rains this year have pretty much washed large sections of





paving away.

Another priority costing \$200,000 will be the retrofitting of the second water filter at the water plant. The first filter is currently off line being rebuilt. While the second filter is functioning properly now, the concern is that it will begin to fail in the coming months if the work is not done.

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

several sponsors, the approach they take to address redistricting varies. The most recent bill, House Bill 140, Fairness and Integrity in Redistricting, is a bipartisan effort that would not only change state law but would also ask voters to cement those changes by adding them to the state constitution.

HB 140 states that federal law would dictate what mapmakers could and couldn't considering during the redistricting process. The bill states that district lines cannot be based on:

- The political affiliation of registered voters
- Results of previous elections
- Where incumbents or challengers live

• Demographic information of voters, other than the population count

• Any other information which could help identify how voters cast ballots

Districts also would have to satisfy state and federal laws. As much as possible they must have equal populations;

shouldn't divide counties; and must be contiguous (connected geographically) and compact.

The bill also calls for the legislative maps to be made public for a period of 10 days before lawmakers could vote on them, increasing public input on the process.

House Bll 69 calls for an independent commission to draw the maps, (based on somewhat similar rules) and allows a vote on them in the General Assembly as soon as three legislative days after they're introduced. The 11-member "nonpartisan" redistricting commission would be comprised of four registered Democrats, four Republicans and three from neither party. Legislative leaders would submit dozens of nominees, who would be chosen for the commission at random. The commission wouldn't be allowed to use political data in drawing maps.

The panel would propose new legislative and congressional maps to the General Assembly after each decennial census, the next one of which occurs in 2020. The maps would be subject to the approval of the legislature. HB 69 is also only a proposed statute and does not call for a constitutional amendment.

"I wanted to be a co-sponsor for this bill because I believe that a nonpartisan approach is just the fair way to approach it," said Rep. Kevin Corbin. "I believe that most members of the public also feel this way so I would like to help make it happen."

North Carolina Rep Kevin Corbin is one of the many co-sponsors for House Bill 140 and supports the bipartisan effort, however his counterpart in the senate, Sen. Jim Davis, said he has not had time to take up the thought of redistricting and can't speculate as to how a similar measure would fair in the senate.

"I know little about House bills and do not have time to digest them in order to provide an informed opinion," said Senator Jim Davis when asked about the proposed House Bills and if similar actions would be taken in the Senate. "[I] Also cannot predict if they would survive in the Senate."

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



WORD MATTER **Spring, Glorious Spring!**

K, I'm going to climb out on a limb for a moment. I think Spring is either finally here or close at hand.

I know we can all read a calendar. It's mid-April and that means 'technical' Spring arrived nearly a month ago. I'm not talking about 'technical' Spring. I'm talking about

warmer weather, longer days, short sleeves (or no sleeves, if that's your jam), and putting away the outdoor heating devices at local eateries.

Manifestations of Spring are all literally around us. Baseball is underway. Yay, Baseball! Shuttered businesses are beginning to reopen in advance of the ever-extending period of time we locals refer to as 'season.' Little, tiny buds are peeking from the ends of branches. Red, vellow and green. I can see them right outside my window. Here on the plateau they're not quite ready to pop, but ... they're close, soon.

The Masters at Augusta is behind us. And, how about that outcome, linksters? The Kentucky Derby is just around the corner; first Saturday in May, racing fans. These annual events are time tested harbingers of Spring.

Closets everywhere (except perhaps Florida) are being repurposed. Optimists are switching out long johns, flannels, and Uggs in favor of short-sleeved shirts. country club shorts, and sandals. Landscaping stores and departments are filling floors and hanging racks with bags of mulch and potting soil, fern and philodendron baskets, seeds packets ... I'm telling vou ... it's on its way.

As for me, I say, bring it on!

But wait. 'Not so fast,' as Lee Corso will say every Saturday, later on in the year. Even though we take note of the arrival of tomato and vegetable plants for sale, along with selected herbs, we've all heard the warnings, loud and clear; don't start planting flowers and vegetables just yet. Still, where I'm perched, out here on that limb. I have to tell you, from this vantage point I am seeing the signs, folks. It's going to happen and it's going to happen soon.

Florida plates, as well, of course. Lines will form at area restaurants. Favorite grocery items will fly off the shelves at Bryson's and Ingles. Cars on our roads will start slowing down; some to view the awesomeness of nature's majesty, others, just because.

It's difficult not to get excited by the prospect of the canopy once again filling out throughout the Nantahala Forest. Look for that to be complete right around mid-May. Keep your eyes peeled for hikers and bikers on our meandering trails and twisty roads. They're on their way.

Make no mistake, fellow plateau-dwellers. It's coming. I can see it, smell it, taste it, feel it. It's heading our way. Not 'technical,' mind you, but the real deal. That's right! I'm talking about Spring!

Highlands' business continues to be rosv.

Town Manager Josh Ward said he didn't see a need to raise the town's tax rate. It's .164 cents per each \$100 of assessed value with .015 cents of that earmarked for recreation capital improvements.

After the recent property revaluation Macon County's real property assessment is \$1,737,843,910. That represents a 4.3% increase in value from the last reval but this is prior to possible appeals. Highlands expects to get \$2,793,062 of that. In addition, based on Jackson County taxable real property, Macon/Jackson taxable personal property and Macon/lackson taxable utility property, in total Highlands expects to get \$2.950.801.

That in addition to proceeds from its enterprise funds will fund the capital and operational needs in the 2019-'20 budget year.

Highlands fire tax is currently .01 per \$100 assessed value and is collected in town and in the township which is in the county. It can only be used for fire department matters

Since Highlands property values are so high, the fire tax is the lowest in the county. However, the fire tax will likely increase so the town can pay for the Fire Department's new building.

The town will take out a loan - now estimated to be \$3 million though that is not a firm number - and the town will pay itself back over the years from fire tax proceeds.

The Water & Sewer and Electric enterprise funds are healthy so no increase in rates is expected. but there will likely be an increase in sanitation fees because that fund is just breaking even. Money is needed to purchase the proposed bear-resistant toters in the commercial district.

Based on these financials, the administration is considering items on the capital outlay list.

Last Thursday several proposed projects were considered with paying a big issue.

THE ABOLITIONIST'S

Commissioners say paving is a topic they are constantly asked about and with the rains this past vear there are two roads that just can't wait - Satulah and Cullasaia Drive. Satulah would cost \$102,000 and Cullasaia – 1.1 miles long from US 64 east - would cost \$215,000.

Road and sidewalk repairs and maintenance is another hot issue. So, \$30,000 will likely be allocated for sidewalk repairs, \$30,000 for salt and \$20,000 for paint striping.

Of course, the water/sewer department has a lot of issues.

The Buckhorn Water tank and pump station that was a surprise "need" last year is expected to come in at the vicinity of \$600.000 when all is said and done. The Split Rail waterline improvements – on the back burner for a few years – is now front and center, Public Works Director Lamar Nix said he would really like to get that done as water delivery to that area is crucial. 

cost \$876,000.

In the news lately are the water plant filters. The #1 filter is being repaired with money avajilable in the 2018-'19 budget. Upgrades to the #2 filter need to be done as it's carrying the load. Being proactive by spending the necessary \$200,000 in FY 2019-'20 for an upgrade will likely keep it from failing.

Sewer pump SCADA and hardware replacements are needed for Shelby Place and the old sewer plant and the Buckhorn/country club plant for a total of \$86,000.

Then there's Wastewater Treatment Plant hardware and equipment needs totaling \$176,500.

A reconductor portion on US 64 east within the town limits needs to be replaced for \$147,000 and a chipper truck needs to be replaced for \$890,000. The reconductor portion of Horsecove Road won't be financed in the 2019-'20 budget.

In the sanitation department the "need" is the commercial bear-resistant toters for \$123,000 and \$30,000 to change out dumpsters which is done on a rotating basis.

In the MIS/GIS department a re-

placement Jeep has been requested for \$33,000 as well a GPS replacement for \$5,000. Ground penetrating radar which was requested for \$30,000 probably won't make it in the budget this year.

In the Parks & Recreation Dept. a tennis court replacement for \$105,000 is on the list as is \$54,000 for exercise equipment and a new pool slide.

Landscaping of the Town Hall complex – particularly around the veterans' memorial – will likely make it this year for \$159,000.

The total considered across all departments: General Fund, Water/Sewer Fund, Electric Fund and Sanitation Fund minus the items that were cut this first go-around is \$3,004,000.

The idea is that projects in particular departments will be funded with money from those funds. Tax revenue will be used to fund everything else.

The town's current General Fund balance is \$4 million. The General Fund Reserve is \$3.8 million and the Electric Fund Reserve is \$4 million. Last year, the town didn't need to use any of that money.




