

#### Local races look to be full

A slew of candidates flooded the Macon County Board of Education office on Monday, Dec. 6 just as filing opened for the 2022 Election. It closes Dec. 17.

A temporary court injunction delayed some state-level filings on Monday, however by Tuesday, all offices were back open for filing.

The North Carolina Court of Appeals announced Monday moments before filing opened at noon that filing for several state races were temporarily blocked because of an ongoing dispute over the district maps, which were approved by the General Assembly earlier this year. The North Carolina Court of Appeals later announced the decision was lifted and all races could be opened to candidates.

In North Carolina, the statewide primary is scheduled for Tuesday, March 8, 2022. During this election, voters can choose which candidates they prefer to be on the general election ballot in November. The purpose of a primary is to narrow the field of candidates for the general election.

Registered voters across the state can vote in the primary. However, voters affiliated with a political party will be given a ballot of candidates for their party. Unaffiliated voters can choose the ballot of candidates for any party: Democratic, Libertarian, or Republican.

Each candidate that wins in each contest on their party's ballot will become a nominee. The nominee will appear on the ballot in the general election contest. To become the party's nominee, the candidate must win by at least 30 percent of the vote plus one.

The Highlands Planning Board is currently reviewing a drafted conceptual proposal that our attorneys presented. That review process will continue in the coming weeks before planning board recommendations are forwarded to the Town Board.






Unfortunately, both of their parents died when they were young, leaving them their home, but not much money. In order to



## WCU lab helps Swedish researcher with mosquito project

Cullowhee - Don't swat at that mosquito. Swedish entomologist Anders Lindström is sitting in a Western Carolina University lab, patiently waiting for it to stay put on a leaf cutting long enough to take its photo.

When the mosquito takes flight, Lindström captures it in a vial and puts it back on the leaf.

Lindström recently visited Cullowhee from the Swedish National Veterinary Institute. He was working in WCU's Mosquito and Vector-Borne Infectious Disease Facility, which specializes in researching and educating people about mosquito-borne diseases of Western North Carolina.

Lindström traveled to the facility to photograph two local mosquito species for a guidebook he's creating. It's a project for the European Centre for Disease Control and Prevention. The publication aims to be a tool for nonentomologists to identify and report invasive mosquito species in Europe and help stop their spread across that continent.

The mosquito flies off again. And again. Lindström says he often has to offer the bloodthirsty insects a sacrificial finger as a perch to help them pose long enough for a photo.

"Usually, it's a good way to make them sit still. But these are too young, I think. They don't seem interested in me," Lindström says of the American rock pool mosquito, Aedes atropalpus, he's trying to photograph. The other mosquito species, the eastern tree hole mosquito, Aedes triseriatus, later proves more than happy to take a bite of Lindström's finger.

The WCU facility maintains collections of many of North Carolina's mosquito species and can make them available to researchers. Shipping the two requested mosquito species to Sweden proved impossible, so the lab hatched some for Lindström to come photograph in person.

Both species are native to North Carolina and much of Eastern North America. They grow in small water pools on trees and among rocks — and in countless items that can hold a bit of water and are commonly found outside homes and businesses. The mosquitoes are not native to Europe, so they will go into the guidebook as invasive species of concern.

The American rock pool mosquito has already been reported in parts of Europe. The eastern tree hole mosquito has not. It was, however, found in a batch of used tires shipped to the continent from North America. "They have been exterminated, at least that's what we think," Lindström says of Aedes triseriatus in Europe. "Whole tire yards were sprayed and they have been doing captures afterwards and they have not been found again."

Through human trade and travel, mosquitoes can be transported from continent to continent and create problems for quality of life, public health and the environment, Lindström says. He points to the tiger mosquito, Aedes albopictus, and the bush mosquito, Aedes japonicus, as two examples. Both were transported from Asia to North America and to Europe, where they now bite aggressively and transmit diseases.

The tiger mosquito "is all around the Mediterranean now and it's spreading," Lindström says. "It's a really annoying mosquito that lives close to people and we have had outbreaks of dengue, chikungunya, Zika, all the associated viruses."

The European Centre for Disease Prevention and Control will make the mosquito guidebook available for free online and translate it into all the various European languages. The guide will include identification tips, photos and detailed illustrations. The goal, Lindström says. is to help more people observe and report invasive mosquitoes for control measures before they become well-established, problematic and more difficult, if not impossible, to eradicate from the landscape.

"We are happy to help Anders as he develops this important surveillance tool," says Brian Byrd, an environmental health sciences professor and supervisor of WCU's Mosquito and Vector-Borne Infectious Disease Facility. "We also understand the impacts of invasive mosquitoes as there are two invasive Aedes species here in Western North Carolina that are known to transmit La Crosse virus — our most common mosquito-borne disease in North Carolina."

The WCU facility started its mosquito collection in 2008. It has since preserved more than 4,000 specimens representing more than 100 mosquito species from North America.



improvements to this district than we even thought possible just a year ago. In short, I love my current position as NC Senator and I feel I can offer more to the citizens of Western North Carolina as a Senator at this point than I could as a freshman Congressman."

Sen. Corbin began debating a run for Congress mid-November with the surprise announcement that current Representative Madison Cawthorn will not be seeking reelection in his current district and instead will be running for office in the newly drawn NC District 13.

Sen. Corbin said Rep. Cawthorn's announcement came as a surprise and left little time to clearly assess the situation and determine a real feasibility of a Congressional run.

"As soon as I heard about Rep. Cawthorn, I immediately began talking with my family and close friends about the idea

of running for Congress and asked them to not give me an immediate answer but to thoughtfully examine the situation. We found that the district is conservative-leaning and I won a Republican Primary election for my current Senate seat with a margin of 80% to 20%. With those factors the 'electability' conclusion was simply this: If we made a run and worked hard, the likelihood of winning the Congressional seat is good."

However, although Corbin received tremendous support from across the state while he was considering a run for Congress, ultimately the decision was made to remain in the General Assembly.

Despite the statically probability of winning the open Congressional seat, Sen. Corbin said it wasn't the right time for him or his family.

"The first and more important part of the decision-making process was to consider what is right for my family, my district, and myself," said Sen. Corbin. "The conclusion became clear. My family was hesitant about such a quick decision. Nobody in our 'camp' knew about the Cawthorn decision until it was revealed in the media a couple of weeks ago. We didn't have a good feeling about that. Secondly, I have quickly gained respect in the General Assembly having been there now three terms. I am in line to increase seniority in the Senate. Every member has a vote, and we all understand that, but seniority is certainly a factor when it comes to things such as chairing committees, influence with other Senators, and possibilities of positions of leadership. Those are all factors in how well I am able to serve my district."

Just as the recent census brought changes that resulted in the new Congressional District Rep. Cawthorn intends to run in, Sen. Corbin's Senate District 50 too will change slightly with the addition of Transylvania County.

"I look forward to having the opportunity of serving the folks of Transylvania County and have already started working to earn their support as their Senator," said Corbin. "Staying in my current position brings other possibilities for serving the State of NC which is a greater calling for me than serving in Washington. I don't assume anything and am very careful to recognize that my re-election to the NC Senate is up to the voters and not me. I am however, simply announcing that I will file for re-election."

ban orders. I have issued an outdoor fire ban for the Town of Highlands," he said. "It will remain in effect until weather conditions change and the state and county rescind their orders."

But the open burn ban has been lifted across the state for now. According to Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler, it is fall wildfire season in North Carolina and precautions should always be taken.

"We were seeing wildfire activity increase due to dry conditions," said Troxler. "With those type of conditions, a statewide burn ban was necessary to reduce the risk of fires starting and spreading quickly. Our top priority is always to protect lives, property and forestland across the state."

Under North Carolina law, the ban prohibited all open burning, regardless of whether a permit was previously issued. The issuance of any new permits is also suspended when bans are initiated. Anyone violating a burn ban faces a \$100 fine plus \$183 court costs. Any person responsible for setting a fire may be liable for any expenses related to extinguishing the fire.

When a ban is called it's usually for open burning which includes burning leaves, branches or other plant material. In all cases, burning trash, lumber, tires, newspapers, plastics or other nonvegetative material is illegal.

According to the NC Forest Service, campfires, fire pits, outdoor fireplaces and burn barrels are considered open burning and are subject to the burn ban if more than 100 feet from an occupied dwelling.

However, within 100 feet of an occupied dwelling, local government agencies have jurisdiction over open burning which would include campfires, fire pits, outdoor fireplaces, burn barrels and even grills. During a burn ban, portable gas stoves or grills are alternate methods for cooking food while camping.

But, if a fire within a 100-foot area of a dwelling escapes containment, a North Carolina forest ranger may take reasonable steps to extinguish or control it. The person responsible for setting the fire may be liable for any expenses related to extinguishing the fire.

Highlands Fire & Rescue Chief Ryan Gearhart said he prohibits outdoor burning of all kinds within 100 feet of a dwelling and beyond when a ban is initiated.


"There is zero outdoor burning of any kind allowed within the town limits during a ban," he said. "However, outside town limits, as per the NC Forest Service, outdoor burning within 100 feet of an occupied dwelling is allowed."

However, even outside the town limits, Gearhart asks that people use extreme caution because fires can spread rapidly easily hopping town and county lines.

"We have not necessarily seen an increase in fires locally this fire season, but we don't want to either," he said."

The NC Forest Service lifted the ban Wednesday afternoon and Highlands followed suit.
