Bronze bells are positioned at church

It was quite a spectacle for onlookers who happened to see

over two tons of cast bronze bells hoisted 40 feet into the air at the Episcopal Church of the Incarnation in Highlands on June 16.

The four new bells weigh 4,500 pounds with the largest over 1,000 pounds and are part of a

New pickleball courts are met with enthusiasm

"I am amazed at the turnout for pickleball," said Mayor Pat Taylor at the official ribbon cutting of the new court system on

"Our Town Manager Josh Ward and Recreation Director Lester Norris told the board of the need to convert a little-used set of tennis courts to the pickleball court and the rest was history."

The money needed to make the conversion was put into the FY '21-'22 budget so work could

begin in time for this season.

"This goes to show that the town and the Rec Dept. are open to the changing needs of its citizens," said Taylor.

The Rec Park now boasts a covered year-round pool, tennis courts, nine pickleball courts three inside and six outside - and at skateboard park.

According to Norris, the final cost to build the six pickleball courts was \$123,580.69. This


Henry Harrison Reese



t is barely past the first half of 2021, and I'm looking at the 2023 calendar? Whoa... slow down, you may say. Live in the moment. And you are right. Totally, Almost,

As far as real estate investments go. 2023 could be an important year, and it is the kind of important vou do not want to let slip up on you. Here are a few Jeannie Chambers things to look forward to:

• 2023 – Macon County tax revaluation. Why it may be impor-

tant: In 2019, the last time the property taxes were revaluated, the tax office was quoted. "The market for each house is different depending on the location. Properties will not increase the same percentage county wide. Location is still a big factor." Whether the same will hold true for the 2023 revaluation remans to be seen. In 2019, Highlands Township made up 46% of the tax base. Based on prior years, revaluation may be completed by December 2022, and after a period of time for appeals, the tax bills are sent to the property owner in August and are due by the end of the year. This is probably where I should mention that I am not a tax expert in any shape or form. The Macon County website has information and links to further your knowledge on these matters. The current tax rate is .00349. In 2015, the tax rate was .00279.


• 2023 – the Federal Reserve may be upping the interest rate. Why it may be important: We have been enjoying ultra-low interest rates for a while now. What goes down, must go up? In our topsy-turvy world, that may be happening in 2023. In the 1970s, the rates went from 7% to 9%. And then up to 16% in the 1980s, remember those days? We knew when the rates dropped so low that it could not last forever. If you are considering refinanc-

WCU waives tuition for summer students

CULLOWHEE - Western Carolina University will award approximately \$3.775 million in federal Higher Education Emergency Relief Funds (HEERF III) to students this summer. WCU is allocating the funds immediately to be utilized toward student success initiatives, including waivers for tuition for all eligible undergraduate students enrolled in any summer session term. The waivers do not include fees.

Also included in the allocation is nearly \$407,000 to support the summer 2021 Academic Success Programand Catamount Gap programs. Program costs that are covered include tuition, fees, residential living (housing), and meal plan costs.








the end of Phase 3 (Plan Development) in the 4-Phase continuum.

Two members of the Planning Board are on the Community Plan Steering Committee – Chairman Armstrong and Darren Whatley – so they have read it front to back

Initially, talk centered around the extension or creation of sidewalks but included discussion about litter on Highlands' roadways and the town allocating money to do things – construct sidewalks for instance "since it has no problem spending money," which was an assumed reference to the new Fire and Rescue Department complex on US 64 west and Oak Street.

Currently, where the town constructs sidewalks is mostly determined by the Master Sidewalk Plan which was adopted in 2008. With Highlands' growth, Assistant Planning Director Michael Mathis agreed, as did the authors of the Draft Community Plan, that it needs to be updated.

According to the Master Sidewalk Plan.

which the town uses to construct sidewalks as money allows, developers of new construction in the downtown area within the confines of the Master Plan must build a sidewalk. To that end, the proposed Bryson cluster development on 5th Street was mentioned, but Mathis reminded the board that the development isn't part of the Master Sidewalk Plan so the developers aren't required to construct a sidewalk.

Citizen Chip Wilson asked if the Community Plan mentioned or if the town would consider constructing a sidewalk from Poplar Street where it ends, to the entrance to Little Bear Pen off US 64 east.

However, recommendations in the Community Plan include extending The Greenway from Poplar Street along US 64 east to Little Bear Pen – not extending the sidewalk. Mathis took note and said he would mention it to the Stewart Company.

Rick Siegel who lives in Shelby Place off NC 28 south asked if the town or the Plan considered extending a sidewalk from where it ends at Highlands Plaza down to Shelby Place and would the town consider doing that.

Sidewalk extensions on NC 106 from Spring Street to Hummingbird Lane and from The Bascom bridge to Mirror Lake Road were also discussed.

Both those extensions are in the Macon County Transportation Plan which was adopted by all required entities in the county, including Highlands at its May Town Board meeting, but the understanding is that it would take years, possibly decades for those two projects to be funded by the state.

That got everyone asking if NC DOT

would allow the town to do the job.

According to Public Service Director Lamar Nix, since those aren't town roads, the town would need an encroachment permit from NC DOT and be able to fund the projects itself.

"If laying sidewalks was cheap or easy it would have already been done," he said. "I estimated the one down NC 106 a few years ago. It was a million dollars then. I have not estimated the other two."

Folks asked if federal infrastructure money could help fund such projects.

Currently, USDOT is seeking projects to award under the Infrastructure for Rebuilding America Grant Program (INFRA) to both large and small projects.

For a large project, the INFRA grant must be at least \$25 million. For a small project, the grant must be at least \$5 million.

Overall program guidelines require that at least 25 percent of INFRA funding be for rural projects so it's possible Highlands fits into that category.

INFRA grants may be used to fund a variety of components of an infrastructure project, however, the Department is specifically focused on projects in which the local sponsor is significantly invested and is positioned to proceed rapidly to construction (shovel ready).


Eligible INFRA project costs may include: reconstruction, rehabilitation, acquisition of property (including land related to the project and improvements to the land), environmental mitigation, construction contingencies, equipment acquisition, and



Highlands Hurricanes suffer first loss of the season

Though out-numbered almost 4 to 1, the Highlands Hurricanes Swim Team did well Thursday, June 24 in Franklin against perennial conference champion Franklin Amateur Swim Team (FAST) even though they lost with a score of 794-533.

FAST scored approximately 6 pts per swimmer while The Hurricanes scored 15 pts per swimmer – outscoring FAST per swimmer.

The Hurricanes brought home 190 ribbons, 54 first-place ones and set 75 personal records (PRs)

Three more Hurricanes were added to the National team headed to the Jr. Olympics in Houston. They were sisters Sophia and Lilliana Jandera Chambless and Mark Gross. That makes nine.

The Hurricanes were led by meet high-scorer Lilliana Jandera Chambless, Timmy McDowell, and Junior Olympian Chase Kenter, all who went undefeated in their five races. Lilliana scored 27 pts and had 3 PRs, both McDowell and Kenter scored 24. McDowell had 3 Prs, Kenter, 1.

Justin Powell also scored 24 pts. and 3 Prs.

Sophia Jandera Chambless, Jr. Olympian Aniah McKim and Jr. Olympic qualifier Mark Gross, Layla Babac and Blake Kenter scored 22 pts. \$6M renovation in the works at the Church.

The bells were manufactured by The Verdin Company out of Cincinnati and each are tuned to produce a different sound, said the Rev. Bentley Manning, Rector at Church of the Incarnation.

"For centuries, church bells have served the very basic function of calling people to prayer," said Fr. Manning. "Additionally, bells are used to mark occasions like weddings and funerals. It has been said that bells are a sort of 'singing icon,' as they create beautiful harmonic space around the church, just as art and architecture define it visually. In the mind of Henry Wadsworth Longfellow 'bells are the voice of the church."

Hoisting them into position can be tricky, said Andrew MacColl, Sr. Project Manager at J Davis Construction Inc in charge of the renovations.

"Challenges are traffic control, proper crane lifting height, and verification that other components will fit," said MacColl.

Work began in Nov. 2020, and highlights of the project include increasing the capacity of the main Sanctuary from 220 to 290, installing a door on the Main Street side of the building, adding a spire to the new Main Street entrance to balance out the bell tower on the 5th Street side, creating an option for service overflow into Jacobs Hall with direct line of sight to the Sanctuary instead of viewing on a TV screen, and making improvements to the 5th Street

entrance

Initial plans were to open the new sanctuary by June 1, but delays have pushed that date back to September.

"Minor delays on this," said MacColl. "It is just a long process with eight different subcontractors to coordinate each installed component."

Fr. Manning said at this stage in the project the new 5th Street entrance is nearly complete, the bells have been installed, the spire will arrive in mid-July, and new stone flooring is being installed in the main sanctuary.

He added that he's grateful the community has been so understanding and patient throughout construction.

"I would like to thank the community again for their grace and forbearance during this project," said Fr. Manning. "Construction can cause many inconveniences but I'm grateful for the encouragement and kind words we have received from so very many in the community."

MacColl said next on the list is installing new stone tiling in the Nave that was shipped overseas from Spain.

"We at JDavis are excited about this project and finishing up this early fall," said MacColl. "It has been quite the challenge to figure out the existing components to this building. There are three different additions here and all were built at different time, so the construction is unique."






ikely, the most familiar part of the U.S. Declaration of Independence, reads as follows, "We hold these Itruths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness."

Amazing, there was unanimity among all of the representatives of the thirteen original colonies who endorsed the Declaration. This foundation undergirds not only the Declaration, but also the U.S. Constitution and nearly all of the documents and correspondence of our formative years. Let freedom, let liberty ring!

How can it be then that we have failed so miserably in terms of equality? Where the voices of many are not heard in the public square. How can it be that we have failed so miserably in terms of life? Where millions of children have been denied their right to life, killed for the 'right' of another. How can it be that we have failed so miserably in terms of liberty? Where a declaration was been made recently on the floor of the U. S. House of Representatives that God's will is of no concern to the proceedings of Congress. How can it be that we have failed so miserably in terms of the pursuit of happiness? Where federal agencies have been weaponized to intimidate law abiding citizens to do so.

can also sell it before the new values are posted. Why in the world would you want to do that? Some astute buyers are very aware of the quality of work that has gone into a home. The town also spent \$9,020 moving the brick pad and bench, building a retainer wall, leveling and graveling the sitting area and reseeding the area around the courts for a


total of \$123,580.69.
