

Police dogs alert to drugs in a vehicle at Highlands School

On Monday, Nov. 15, K9 Hope and handler Master Officer Kinsland of the Highlands Police Department and K9 Jax and handler Deputy Dereck Stamey of the Macon County Sheriff's Office were on-campus at Highlands School to conduct a K9 sniff of the student parking areas.

During this exercise, K9 Hope located a small amount of marijuana in a student's vehicle. The school administration then requested the student to come to the car. A subsequent search of the vehicle was conducted by Highlands Police officers, who then located a hunting rifle and handgun in the vehicle. The •See DRUGS page 11

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Macon County is in a new Congressional District

Cawthorn to seek election in different district; Sen. Kevin Corbin considering a run

The 2020 Census added a Congressional Seat in North Carolina, which was recently approved by the North Carolina legislature.

In addition, the majority of western North Carolina residents who have historically been located in District 11 will now be considered District 14 – this includes Macon County and much of far Western North Carolina. A portion of Watauga County will also now be in the 14th District.

McDowell, Polk and Rutherford counties have been moved to the 13th District.

The name of the district is not the only thing that is changing. Representative Madison Cawthorn announced Thursday night that he will not be seeking election in District 14 (previously District 11) and will instead be running for election in the newly drawn District 13.

"I will be running for Congress in the 13th Congressional District," Cawthorn said in a video posted around 7 p.m. on Thursday. "This move is not an abandonment. In fact, it's quite the opposite. It is a move to take more ground for constitutional conservatism. In my heart, I represent North Carolina as a whole, not some arbitrary line that some politician drew this cycle. This was not an easy decision."

Cawthorn's announcement surprised the district, which already has a crowded field of candidates vying for the seat. The state filing period runs Dec. 6 to 17, with the primaries set for March 8.

"I believe we have a unique opportunity to increase conservative leadership from North •See DISTRICT page 10

Town Board meeting details

Town Board meeting at the Highlands Community Building next to the ball field. The meeting will begin at 7 pm with public comment as the first item on the agenda. The meeting can also be access on YouTube by way of the town website.

The board will review the current policy and his request.


session minutes and to discuss confidentiality protocols. Our attorneys reviewing the STR issue and pending lawsuit will also brief the board. I anticipate the Town Broad holding a joint workshop meeting with the planning board very soon. This meeting will be open to the public, but no public comment will be taken. Public response and comment will follow at subsequent meetings.

Paving contractors should be rapping up the paving of Upper and Lower Lake Roads. Those two roads were the last in the scheduled town roads to be paved this year. The town maintains a list of roads that will be paved in the future. The priority list may be adjusted from year to year, based on the deterioration of certain roads especially over a harsh winter period. For the past several years the board has implemented a vigorous town street paving program. That program will continue for several years.



I want to thank the ABC employees and ABC board members for the work and effort that they have put into the operation of the store. There has been a steady growth in sales and profits over the past several years.







Carolina," Cawthorn said. "I have every confidence in the world that regardless of where I run the 14th congressional district will send a patriotic fighter to DC. Knowing the political realities of the 13th district I am afraid that another establishment 'go along to get along' Republican would prevail there. I will not let that happen. I will be running for congress in the 13th Congressional District."

According to Cawthorn's video statement, his decision to run in District 13 was made primarily because his residence is close to the border between District 13 and 14.

Rep. Cawthorn lives in Henderson County and while the entirety of Henderson County remains in District 14, the county borders Rutherford County which is located in the newly drawn District 13.

Although candidates do not have to live in the Congressional District they run in for election, in February 2020 while seeking office in District 11 and facing half a dozen opponents from outside of WNC, Cawthorn said, "I grew up and live in the 11th district. This is my home. You shouldn't be allowed to represent the district if you don't live in it. How do you know what's best for the district if you don't even live there?"

In Cawthorn's video statement, he also claimed that half of the counties now in District 13 are counties he currently represents in District 11. Polk and McDowell counties and a slice of Rutherford County will move from District 11 to District 13 and accounts for around 100,000 residents. The remaining area of District 13 includes Burke, Cleveland, Gaston, and a slice of Mecklenburg County which will all be new territories for Cawthorn.

Corbin may enter race

With the news the Rep. Madison Cawthorn will not be seeking election in Western North Carolina, a familiar face has said that he is considering a run in District 14 — which comprises the majority of the current District 11.

"Soon after Rep. Cawthorn made it public that he wasn't going to run for re-election in our district, my phone started ringing. I have told people that I am considering it. At this point, I will tell you I'm giving it a very, very serious look," said Sen. Kevin Corbin (R-Franklin). Sen. Corbin said the he is happy working in the North Carolina General Assembly and after one term serving in the Senate, a run for Congress may be in the near future.

"My first thought when people asked if I was considering running, was, 'No, I'm very happy at the Senate," said Senator Corbin. "Right now in this capacity, I am in a place to do a lot of good for my district,' and that's important to me," said Corbin. "But, I have had a lot of response from across the district asking for me to step up and a lot of people offering to help me in that endeavor, so it is a possibility."

Sen. Corbin is currently serving his freshman term in the North Carolina Senate, but is no stranger to Raleigh. Sen. Corbin made the move to the Senate after serving two terms in the North Carolina House of Representatives serving NC District 120.

The filing period for Congress opens Dec. 6 and continues until December 17, with the primaries set for March 8. The election for Congress would be in November 2022.

Optum is offering Pediatric Pfizer for 5-11 year-olds today, Thurs., Nov. 18 at the Highlands Rec Park. The Pfizer vaccine for adults and teens as well as the booster for those who have received the first two shots is also available. The hours of operation are 9a-5p.

The Optum clinic will be closed on Thanksgiving but will be extending its commitment to Highlands through December.

A FEMA crew will be offering a Covid-19 drive-through vaccine clinic at the Cashiers Rec Center on Friday, Nov. 19 and Friday, Dec. 10 from 10a-6p to provide the Covid-19 vaccine. They will offer all three vaccines – Moderna, J&J, and Pfizer for adults and teens as well as boosters and the Pfizer pediatric vaccine. No appointments are necessary.

Vaccines for 5-years and older are also available at the Macon County Health Dept.

A legal guardian of those under the age of 18 must be there for them to receive the vaccination. To schedule an appointment, call the Call Center at 828-524-1500 – there is no waitlist. The Macon County Vaccine Call Center is open Monday – Friday, from 8am to 5pm.

In addition, on Tuesday night, parents of Highlands School students got a call from the administration letting them know about the free Pediatric Pfizer Clinic for children ages 5 to 11 set for Friday, Nov. 19 from 4-6 p.m. at the school.

The school emailed three documents regarding the vaccine – one is a permission form, one is the pre-vaccination screening form and the other is an informational piece. A link to the forms was included in the email sent to parents from the school.

The CVMS Data Request registration form needs to be completed and submitted online or dropped off at the school prior to the clinic on Friday to register the student.

Second is the Pre-vaccination screening form. It, too, needs to be completed and emailed or taken to the school at the time of the clinic. The doctors will need this form prior to vaccination.

Third, is the Covid Vaccine for Children Fact Sheet which doesn't need to be returned to the school.

Parents or guardians must be present and consent to their child receiving the vaccine. After the shot is given, there is a wait period of 15-30 minutes for observation. MC EMS and physicians will be on-site.

A second Pediatric Pfizer Clinic for children ages 5 to 11 is planned for Dec. 10 at Highlands School.

16-year-old male student told officers that the hunting rifle and handgun were left in the vehicle after returning from a hunting trip over the weekend; items of hunting equipment found in the vehicle were consistent with this statement.

The Highlands Police Dept. seized the hunting rifle, handgun, and marijuana.

According to the Highlands Police Department School Resource Officer, there have been no threats or indicators of violent behavior from this student and no suspicions of violent intent.

Since the student is under the age of 18, the Department of Juvenile Justice was

contacted, and juvenile petitions have been submitted to the Juvenile Court System in this matter.

"The Highlands Police Department and Highlands School administration maintain an ongoing partnership to promote community safety," said Highlands Police Chief Andrea Holland. "One aspect of this partnership involves bringing trained K9 teams to the Highlands School campus to perform open-air sniffs throughout the school grounds and around student vehicles parked on campus. These exercises are designed to enhance school safety and also serve to provide additional training to our K-9 teams."

WNC AgOptions grantees receive \$219,000 for farm projects

Farmers in western North Carolina are receiving support to expand, diversify and modify operations in the midst of a pandemic. WNC Agricultural Options awarded 38 farm businesses a total of \$219,000 in \$3,000 and \$6,000 grants. Funded projects reflect the resiliency of WNC farmers as they adapt operations and respond to the dynamics of a world changed by COVID-19.

Three of the farm business received \$3,000 and 35 received \$6,000. N.C. Tobacco Trust Fund Commission has been WNC AgOptions' sole funder since the program's first grant cycle in 2004.

"The WNC AgOptions program has proven success stories," said Bill Teague, Chairman of the N.C. Tobacco Trust Fund Commission. "We continue to be amazed at how these producers utilize these funds to ensure their family farms grow and remain profitable, even in the face of a global pandemic."

Since 1997, Daniel and Lori have operated The Flower Company Farmer and Florist in Otto, NC. As a full-service florist, the Cabes specialize in local grown specialty cut flowers including dahlias and uncommonly found cut flower varieties such as zinnia, cosmos, larkspur, lily, yarrow, sedum, hydrangea and others. They service weddings, events, restaurants, country clubs and churches, while taking daily orders online from their website, including delivery services. A 2020 grant allowed the farm to expand to meet the extremely high demand of dahlias and specialty cut flowers in all their markets. A 2021 grant helped them even more as they were able to purchase a walkin flower cooler for their retail display. Specially designed to keep

flowers at the ideal temperature and humidity to maintain peak freshness for an extended time after harvesting, the cooler provides much-needed efficient storage that will enable the farm to increase production, decrease loss and cut power expenses in half. With these grants, they anticipate becoming the largest and most successful flower farm and florist in western North Carolina.

"N.C. Cooperative Extension is excited to be a part of a program that is making such impressive impacts in the agricultural community," said Ross Young, Madison County Extension Director and WNC AgOptions steering committee leader. "Agriculture is a thriving and ever-changing economic engine in western North Carolina with new enterprises and creative ideas



I wish I could

tell vou

am working on another book. The working title is listed above. The format is rather simple. It consists of some 25 (or so) "Letters" written to those who have been a vital part of my life and who are now in heaven.

The chapters will be rather brief vignettes addressed to these people. I anticipate some four to six pages per chapter. In these pages I will say what I wish I would have said to these people while they were still living. Hence the title: "I Wish I Could Tell You."

I hope that you will pray for the Lord's blessing and favor on this project, and that it will be an encouragement to many people.

In fact; That's what I want to do now. I want to encourage you to be very deliberate and specific in telling others what they mean to you. You don't need to be elaborate or wordy. The heart does have its own communication and language.

For example: You might sit down and draw up a tentative list. It may include family members, business associates, teachers, students, mentors, spiritual leaders and more. In today's world we have unlimited means of communication. Use these and make the contact.

I think that you will be surprised how others are surprised and deeply blessed when they hear from you. Most of us don't do what we do in order to be recognized or even thanked. We do what we do out of love, commitment and honor. Many will be elated when they hear from you and even humbled.

This practice certainly characterized the Apostle Paul in most of his letters. The final chapters of Romans and Colossians are especially noteworthy. Paul understood so very clearly that his "success" was due incalculably to countless others. Some are named, many (probably most) are not.

As you think about what you want to say to these special people in your life, consider this question: "What would I be (or what may I have become) without them?" No man is an island. We all stand on someone else's shoulders. Don't you agree that we ought to tell them?

This is the Thanksgiving season. Indeed, God has blessed America. We have more than any other nation in history. Therefore, we ought to begin our "Thank-Yous" with Holy God Himself. No one knows you better. No one loves you more. Jesus Christ gave His very life on your behalf on the Cross. And frankly, if we started right now giving thanks to Him we still wouldn't be through doing so even in ten million years.

"I thank my God every time I remember You" (Philippians 1:3). So, Paul said to the Church in Philippi. It's a good practice and one which I hope will increasingly characterize all of us.

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

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

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
