On Sunday, April 10 at 5:50pm the Jackson County Emergency Management 911 Center received a call reporting a 3-year-old child, visiting Whitewater Falls with her family, had been swept away in the water at the top of the falls and the current had carried the child over the falls.

Whitewater Falls is in the Jackson County area of Nantahala National Forest.

Emergency responders from Jackson, Transylvania, Haywood, Henderson, and Oconee counties were dispatched to the falls and rescue operations to locate the child were initiated.

Just prior to night fall on Sunday rescuers located the child deceased and entrapped in an area

Cawthorn races from reckless to a possible reckoning

It seems only yesterday that Congressman Madison Cawthorn's most newsworthy achievements were his citations for re-

peatedly violating motor-vehicle laws, including "extreme speeding" while driving his father's car with a revoked license.

Since the traffic citations

Help us build the Town Scholarship fund

We are getting close to the end of school and the graduation season. Highlands School usually has a senior graduation class of about 25 to 30 students. Being one of only three K through 12 schools in the state, our whole town celebrates the accomplishments of our hometown seniors.

Every graduating senior at the Highlands School is eligible to receive a Town of Highlands Scholarship if they will be attending a college, university or vocational school. Students who submit scholarship applications receive some level of support. If a student remains in school, he or she can reapply for a scholarship each year until their schooling is complete.

Highlands community leaders established the town scholarship program for students graduating from the Highlands School. These educational grants are intended to assist students in their educational pursuits beyond high school.

Special legislation was passed in Raleigh in 1977 in order to establish the town scholarship program. This special legislation authorized the town finance department to administer the program. There are no administration fees from the town, so every dollar goes directly to supporting scholarships.

rectly to supporting scholarships.

The town has a scholarship committee consisting of citizens and educators that review all scholarship applications. The amount for individual scholarships is determined by this committee. I announce and present the scholarships to seniors on Highlands School Honors Day in May. Again, every graduating senior that is accepted into an advanced educational program receives a scholarship. Awards can range from around \$800 to over \$2,000. Over a 4-year period of study a student may receive as much as \$4,000 or \$6,000. Forty or more students actually receive support in a given year.

The endowment for the scholarship program is now more than \$880,000. Major gifts to the scholarship endowment will and have had a lasting impact on the educational endeavors of young Highlanders.

As we approach the 50th year of the program, it would be wonderful to receive new major gifts that would propel the endowment to over a million dollars. The growth of the endowment will further increase support for students.

In recent years, the town has sponsored a golf tournament to raise money of scholarships. Also, proceeds from the Three River Fly Fishing Festival go directly to the scholarship program. These fundraising initiatives, and sometimes interest from the endowment, help fund yearly scholarships and preserve the endowment's principal.

Due to unforeseen circumstances the golf tournament will not take place this year. I hope Highlanders will consider making a contribution to the scholarship program so the town can continue to provide scholarships at past levels.

This scholarship program is a great investment in our young people, as well as for the future of Highlands. As mayor, I am asking for your support for this wonderful and unique program. On Honors Day, many additional scholarships are awarded to seniors by civic organizations and area businesses. That community support is an important way to encourage our seniors to strive for new levels of achievements.

John Daugherty McKey, Jr

John Daugherty McKey, Jr., 78, of Highlands, NC, passed away Monday, March 28, 2022. Mr. McKey was born in Atlanta, GA September 10, 1943 to the late Dr. John Daugherty McKey, Sr. and Joyce Roper McKey.



The family moved to Orlando, where John spent his childhood days. He developed a fondness for golf spending time with his father, a pediatrician, at the Orlando Country Club and vacationing at the Highlands Golf Resort.

He expanded his golf experience with friends through high school. John decided to follow his father's footsteps to take courses leading to medical school at Duke University. This lasted one year when the call of the golf course intervened as he was awarded a Golf Scholarship at University of Georgia and became a Golf Team letterman. The team won the SCC Championship in 1965.

He graduated in 1965, also achieving honors in Business Finance. John, then proceeded to earn a law degree at University of Florida and practiced law for 40 years. At intervals, he served in US Army Reserves and later in US Navy Legal Division.

Over his civilian career Mr. McKey was a developer of several golf courses in Palm Beach, FL area. During this period, he played on the Amateur Golf Tour. He was inducted into the Southern Golf Association, later serving on the Board of Directors and as President from 1999-2000. This prestigious organization is instrumental in promoting amateur golf. They Sponsor and officiate the Southern Armature Championship annually, from which the champion qualifies to play in the Walker Cup.

He enjoyed membership in two top ranked golf courses: Seminole Golf Club and Pine Valley Golf Club. Always keen to golf news, when the Highlands Golf Resort was advertised for sale, he co-founded the Highlands Country Club in 1980 with his law partner Jim Mackie. He served on the Golf Committee fostering tournament play many years.

The annual Bobby Jones Invitational gave him an opportunity to enhance the program by bringing in Walker Cup Players and Golf Pros from near and far. John McKey called Highlands Country Club his fondest achievement and claimed Highlands, NC as home in his retirement. It was during this time that he found a new challenge - the game of croquet. He enjoyed dual sports with friends in his later years. And he was a devoted member of the Highlands United Methodist Church.

Survivors include his wife, Kathryn Robinson McKey; daughter, Allison McKey Nichols (Justin); stepdaughters, Rev. Caroline Unzaga (Rev. Jay), Laura Zimmerman (Daniel); grandchildren, Maddy Nichols, Walter Nichols, Henry Nichols, Isabel Unzaga, Sebastian Unzaga, Micah Zimmerman; sister Joy McKey; nieces Carrie Grote (Tom), Erin Elliott (Andy), and Ashley Behm (Aaron); brother-in-law, Dr. Newell Robinson (Victoria); nieces, Ruth Robinson, and Sarah Salzer (Benjamin); nephews, Dr. Bryce Robinson (Katie), and Hunter Robinson.

A graveside service was held Saturday, April 2, 2022, at Highlands Memorial Park, with Rev. Randy Lucas officiating.

came to light last month, the 26-year-old Republican from Hendersonville earned bipartisan rebukes in Congress for calling Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky a “thug” and Ukraine “incredibly evil” — charges that won him accolades on Russian state television.

He then told a right-wing YouTube channel host that unnamed Republican lawmakers in Washington “in their 60s and 70s” had invited him to “orgies” and that he had witnessed them snorting cocaine.

And on April 4, he took to the House floor to lecture Speaker Nancy Pelosi — a grandmother of nine — on biology. “I never imagined that one of my sacred duties in this hallowed chamber would be explaining to the House Speaker the difference between a man and a woman,” Cawthorn announced. “Take notes, Madam Speaker, I’m about to define what a woman is for you: XX chromosomes, no tallywacker.”

But while each outrageous comment gains him publicity and aids his fundraising for re-election, his traffic citations might actually land him in jail.

They are just the latest examples of a decade-long and growing record of law-breaking, rules flouting, accountability evasion, and questionable behavior. But a reckoning may be at hand.

Blames Media, Democrats for His Words

Not only does Cawthorn face a series of court dates for reckless driving and other charges, he has been pointedly ostracized by Republican Party leadership in Congress and within North Carolina who want to see him ousted in the May 17 primary election.

“On any given day, he’s an embarrassment,” U.S. Sen. Richard Burr (R-NC) said of Cawthorn.

“Unfortunately, Madison Cawthorn has fallen well short of the most basic standards Western North Carolina expects from their representatives,” fellow Republican Sen. Thom Tillis said, citing what he said was Cawthorn’s “consistent pattern of juvenile behavior, outlandish statements, and untruthfulness.”

Cawthorn’s assertion that unnamed GOP colleagues snorted cocaine and invited him to an orgy drew a closed-door reprimand from fellow House Republicans and a 30-minute tongue lashing from an outraged Kevin McCarthy, the Republican minority leader.

Cawthorn emerged red-faced from the scolding and, through his press secretary, admitted that he’d “exaggerated.” McCa-

thy bluntly called the stories “untrue” and said the once-rising GOP star had “lost my trust” and needed to “turn his life around.”

But Cawthorn quickly turned to social media to suggest that it was Democrats and the news media, not he, that made the allegations about cocaine use and orgies.

“My comments on a recent podcast appearance calling out corruption have been used by the left and the media to disparage my Republican colleagues and falsely insinuate their involvement in illicit activities,” Cawthorn said in statement posted to Twitter.

Hot Wheels

Whether he can coast to re-election is another question, according to Watchdog interviews with several local Republicans who backed Cawthorn in 2020.

The past month’s revelations, “combined with having a competitive field, have given the opportunity for former supporters not just to complain quietly, but to bolt,” said Western Carolina University Professor Chris Cooper, a specialist in the region’s elections.

Aside from criticism from the Republican Party leadership, Cawthorn faces a legal reckoning for the most recent motor-vehicle violations, the latest in a decade-long pattern.

Asheville Watchdog has found 12 motor-vehicle violations in North Carolina and three other states since Cawthorn became a licensed driver, most of which haven’t been reported before.

“Snake-oil Salesman”

Until now, Cawthorn has avoided serious legal and political consequences. But this may change.

The motor-vehicle violations, although misdemeanors typically satisfied with payment of a fine, are classified as criminal offenses and could carry jail sentences upon conviction. Cawthorn awaits court hearings on April 18 and May 6 stemming from two recent citations in Polk and Cleveland counties respectively, either of which could carry a 20-day jail sentence and \$1,000 fine.

Cawthorn’s brushes with the law haven’t been limited to exceeding speed limits. At least twice over the past several years he’s been ticketed for driving without a valid license or tag. And since his election to Congress from western North Carolina’s 11th District, Cawthorn has been flagged by authorities for a range of other violations not involving driving.

Among these have been four instances

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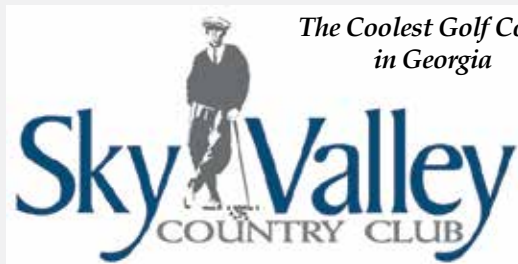

Highlands Rotary Club's Healthy Homes Initiative Project

Rotary Club of Highlands received a grant in the amount of \$45,000 from Highlands Cashiers Health Foundation and Nantahala Health Foundation for the Healthy Homes Initiative, a collaborative program with the Dogwood Health Trust to assist low-income families in need of home repairs that are negatively affecting their quality of life.

Members of the Rotary Club of Highlands circulated applications for home repairs throughout the Highlands area through various non-profits and churches, including the Highlands Emergency Council, Highlands United Methodist Church, International Friendship Center and various other entities that serve low-income individuals and families. Additionally, the availability of this opportunity was published in local papers.

To qualify for assistance, recipient had to earn 60% or less of the household Annual Median Income (AMI) for the county where the property was situated. Additionally, the property had to be owned by the occupant and the repairs had to address health and safety issues.

Since receiving the grant funds in November 2021, Rotary Club of Highlands has received 10 applications, according to

Rotary member Jerry Moore, who is leading the club's efforts.

Two of these applications did not qualify due to non-ownership or failure to meet income requirements. One application is pending and seven are active.

"This grant has created an eye-opening experience that reveals a much larger extent of need in our local communities than one would expect," said Moore. "We are glad to be able to begin to make a difference."

Damages to homes in need of repair range from failing roofs causing water leaks to deteriorating entry steps, rotten fascia, and window seals. Several homes required heating system replacements or repairs, and one dwelling was without electricity using only a propane heater and had no access to running water.

Rotary Club members are working to arrange inspections, evaluations, and construction contracts to help families struggling to sustain their health under these conditions.

The History of Easter

Let only Joys shine through*

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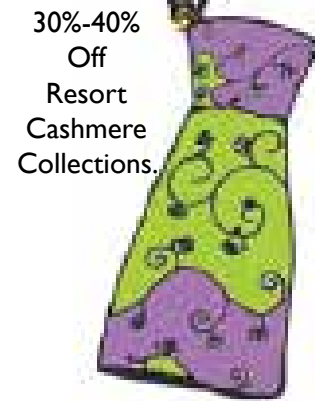

of carrying a switchblade-style knife onto school properties despite warnings from two county sheriffs (potential violations of state law), an attempt to carry a handgun onto a commercial flight from Asheville (a possible violation of federal law), and failure to pay Henderson County property taxes on time. Unpaid taxes expose property to lien and foreclosure.

Former Henderson County Sheriff George Erwin, who in 2020 endorsed Cawthorn's candidacy and urged other sheriffs and law enforcement officers to do likewise, has reversed his position and now apologizes to those he may have persuaded to support the charismatic Cawthorn.

"I know law enforcement is not enamored of him now," Erwin said in an interview with Asheville Watchdog. "He says he 'backs the blue,' but the closest thing I can say to describe him now is 'snake-oil salesman.'"

Extreme Speeding

On Dec. 3, 2019, days before Cawthorn filed his candidacy for the congressional race he ultimately won, he was cited for speeding in Clayton County, Georgia, a southern suburb of Atlanta. He also was given a second citation for having an expired license tag, according to the county court clerk. He paid fines totaling \$445.

Since then, the congressman has been cited for three driving violations that fit the North Carolina definition of "extreme speeding," commonly known as reckless driving, because the speeds were more than 15 miles per hour above the legal limit.

Last Oct. 18 on Interstate 40, near Swannanoa, Cawthorn was cited by a state trooper going 89 miles per hour — 24 miles per hour over the posted limit — in a white Dodge Challenger with the license plate Maddy1. Cawthorn told the trooper that he did not have a wallet or a driver's license. "Really?" he asked when the trooper told him his car was registered to his father.

Cawthorn could have faced a 20-day jail sentence plus a fine.

However, in an out-of-court settlement on March 4, the "extreme speeding" charge was reduced to a routine speeding ticket, according to North Carolina court records.

Three months later, in Polk County, Cawthorn was cited for driving 87 miles per hour in a 70 miles-per-hour zone, legally considered reckless driving. A court hearing on that charge is set for April 18.

Then on March 3, according to another citation, North Carolina Trooper T.J. Gantt stopped Cawthorn in a Toyota

Tacoma pick-up after seeing the vehicle swerve over a highway center line near Shelby in Cleveland County, about midway between Asheville and Charlotte. Gantt ticketed Cawthorn for driving with a revoked license, which may have been the result of prior speeding convictions. If convicted of this offense at a court appearance scheduled for May 6, the congressman again faces a misdemeanor sentence of up to 20 days in jail and a fine.

Cawthorn did not respond to Asheville Watchdog's requests to comment for this article. His spokesman, Luke Ball, also didn't return calls, although he had given a statement to Raleigh television station WRAL saying, "Our office expects the traffic matters to be resolved quickly."

First Brush With the Law

Cawthorn's first brush with the law came barely two months after his 16th birthday. On Oct. 13, 2011, the newly licensed teenager was cited for traveling 89 miles per hour in a 65 miles-per-hour zone. A judge agreed to a reduced charge of going 74 miles-per-hour in that zone, just below the reckless-driving level where Cawthorn's license could have been suspended or revoked.

Less than a year later, on Aug. 18, 2012, Cawthorn was cited on an unknown charge that has been expunged from the court record.

Cawthorn's driving citations continued even after the crippling injuries he sustained in 2014 while riding as a passenger in a car driven by a friend while returning from a Florida vacation. The friend lost control of his car on Interstate 4 near Daytona and crashed into a highway barrier.

Cawthorn, according to the accident record and subsequent testimony in a lawsuit against the driver's insurance policy, was asleep in the passenger seat. The crash left the then-18-year-old a paraplegic who uses a wheelchair and drives with hand controls.

Six of the speeding citations on his record have come since then, including two at speeds above 80 miles per hour. One of those came on April 21, 2016, in Pickens County, South Carolina, just west of Greenville.

A state trooper timed Cawthorn driving "more than 25 MPH over the speed limit," according to the citation. It was reduced in court to speeding between 10 and 15 miles per hour over the limit.

of the waterfall.

Recovery operations throughout the night and early morning led to the child being recovered from the waterfall around 1am on Monday, April 11.

The child has been identified as Nevada Jade Newswanger, age 3, of Denver, PA. The Newswanger family has been residing in Oconee County, SC while working in the area.

Jackson County Sheriff Chip Hall offered his condolences for the family and cautions others about the dangers associated with visits to scenic areas such as White-

water Falls.

"First and foremost, our prayers are with the Newswanger Family as they grieve the loss of this precious young child. With the onset of spring weather, we need to be reminded of the dangers associated with many scenic areas of the region such as waterfalls," he said. "While beautiful to view from a safe distance, venturing out closer to the falls for any reason brings tremendous danger. Always remain at a distance, follow safety precautions and warnings which are in place, and view waterfalls from designated viewing areas."



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Whitewater Falls, at more than 400 feet high, is one of the tallest waterfalls east of the Rockies, and one of the most deadly. At least 15 people have died at the waterfall since 1995, including a rescue squad member in 2020 who died during a rescue, of a 24-year-old who went over the falls the night before.

spokesman Sonny Collins said that reduction was approved by the judge during the court hearing, thus dropping the charge below reckless driving. Collins said traffic-court judges frequently “give speeders a break to reduce the number of points they get on their record” and to reduce the size of a fine.

The record for that citation also includes the FBI’s National Crime Information Center code number indicating “EXTORT-THREAT INJURE REPUTATION.” Collins said he could find no incident report or other information relating to that notation. Asheville Watchdog’s attempts to reach the trooper were unsuccessful. At the time, Cawthorn was working as a staff assistant in the local congressional office of then-Rep. Mark Meadows, a job that entailed answering constituent calls and preparing a review of local news media.

Less than six months later, on Oct. 7, 2016, the 21-year-old Cawthorn, newly enrolled as a freshman at Patrick Henry Col-

lege in Purcellville, VA., was ticketed on the charge “follow too close.”

The record in the Loudoun General District Court shows that Cawthorn was “Tried in Absentia” on January 27, 2017, after he had dropped out of the school. He paid a \$100 fine and \$96 in court costs. The ticketing officer, Purcellville Police Sgt. Paul Kakol, did not return repeated phone calls for comment.

Joy Rides and Predatory Behavior

Cawthorn’s driving habits before and while he was enrolled at Patrick Henry drew other complaints from schoolmates, mostly women. In an article in World magazine, which carries the motto “Sound journalism, grounded in facts and Biblical truth,” three women described Cawthorn as being “sexually aggressive” toward them after being invited to accompany him on a car ride.

The article ran in August 2020, after Cawthorn had won the Republican nomination in the congressional race. A few weeks later but before the general election, more than 150 alumni and Patrick Henry classmates of Cawthorn signed an on-line petition detailing their complaints featuring these car rides. The petition read:

“During his brief time at the college, Cawthorn established a reputation for predatory behavior. His modus operandi was to invite unsuspecting women on ‘joy rides’ in his white Dodge Challenger. Cawthorn would take young women to secluded areas, lock the doors, and proceed to make unwanted sexual advances. It became a regular warning in the female dorms not to be caught alone with Madison Cawthorn. Additionally, he referred to female students as ‘bitches’ and ‘sluts,’ both in private amongst his friends and often publicly. He also called our female peers these derogatory names when they refused to go for a ride in his car.”

At that time, one of the petition signers, Giovanna Lastra, was a senior and student counselor at the college in a female dorm. In

an interview with the Asheville Watchdog, Lastra said so many students complained of being victimized by Cawthorn in this manner that she warned others that, if invited by him to go on a “joy ride,” to “stay away; he’s trouble.”

Cawthorn dropped out of the conservative-Christian school in early 2017 before completing his second semester. He later attributed that decision to his having suffered a “broken heart” because his then-girlfriend had broken off their engagement.

Since his election to Congress in the state’s 11th District, Cawthorn has cultivated a national reputation for publicity seeking and backing right-wing causes. He was a featured speaker at ex-President Trump’s “Stop-the-steal” rally preceding the Jan. 6 attack on the Capitol, and is listed to be a featured speaker at a Trump rally in Selma, NC, on April 9.

He frequently takes to the House floor to attack President Joe Biden, all Democrats, moderate Republicans and especially House Speaker Pelosi. He recently and falsely told a gathering of his supporters and in a Twitter variation that he could personally attest that Pelosi was a drunk. Pelosi’s associates say she does not drink alcohol, and previous reports alleging her drinking have been debunked.

Embracing Conspiracy Theories

He also is quick to embrace far-right conspiracy theories, such as those emanating from the QAnon cult. At a Hendersonville GOP candidates’ forum in March, Cawthorn claimed that a hiking and bicycling trail being completed along the abandoned Ecusta railroad connecting Hendersonville and Brevard was “absolutely a communist project,” part of a Chinese government scheme to control abandoned railroad land throughout the United States.

Last month Cawthorn took credit for obtaining \$200,000 in

federal funds for the town of Sylva, spending he voted against in Congress.

The Ecusta project has been championed by state Sen. Chuck Edwards, who happens to be Cawthorn's leading challenger in the District 11 GOP primary. It has been unanimously backed by local lawmakers, most of whom are Republican, and was developed by the Rails-to-Trails Conservancy, a national non-profit organization created during the Reagan Administration. Brandi Horton, the organization's communications director, told Asheville Watchdog that Cawthorn's allegation is false, adding that, "This is a first for us."

It echoed a charge Cawthorn leveled in his 2020 election campaign falsely claiming that thousands of American children were being kidnapped by South American drug cartels and forced into sex slavery, a trope of far-right conspiracy theorists despite being debunked by the FBI, Homeland Security and other agencies.

Now is the time when we, with the rest of the Church, celebrate the beautiful, life-changing truth that the Body of Christ has claimed victory over the sting of death, the power of sin, and all the forces of wickedness.

Of course, to be a people committed - indeed united - to such a truth will mean our lives have been changed and marked in particular ways. I can imagine few characteristics more central to a life transformed by the power of the resurrection than that of joy.

Christian joy, however, should not be confused with putting on a false grin amid real pain or any dishonest cheerfulness. This is certainly not what such a virtue names or describes. Instead, Christian joy - the joy of the resurrection - is the result of a life caught up into God's own life. To be united with God will mean the resentment, anger, and conceit which so often shape our lives will give way to a love bigger than we could ever engineer on our own. To be sure, Easter breaks open our hearts and allows us to inhabit a world where mercy and grace define the way we understand ourselves, others, and everything around us.

There is so very much in our world which is ready to rob us of the gift of Easter joy - so very much that tries to deny the power of reconciliation and cross-shaped love. Yet the Easter message and the power of the empty tomb proclaims, rather surprisingly, that grief and loss, despair and hopelessness, sin and death do not have the final word. Instead, life and resurrection - indeed God alone - God alone has the last word.

May the empty tomb and the gift of Easter find its way into your heart, making joy possible in surprising and life-changing ways.

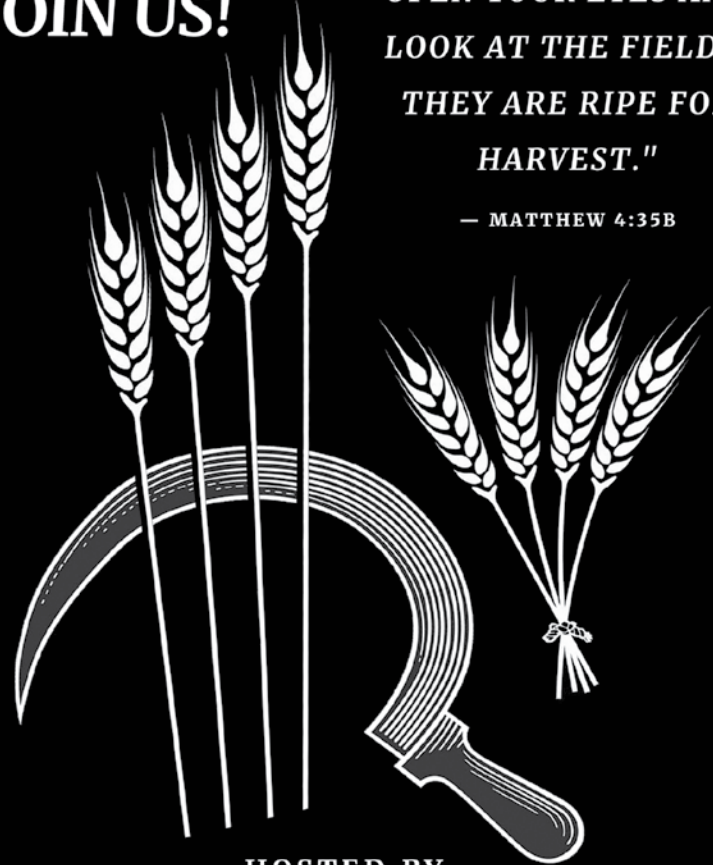

Whether Cawthorn will evade consequences for all of this may be determined by District 11 voters in the state's May 17 primary elections. He faces seven challengers for the GOP nomination.

Among them is Michele Woodhouse. Until recently, she was the Republican Party's District 11 chairwoman and was among Cawthorn's strongest backers. When he announced plans to abandon District 11 to seek reelection in a friendlier adjoining district, he anointed Woodhouse to be his successor and promised to deliver her the endorsement of Trump.

Based on that pledge, she jumped into the Republican race positioning herself as the Cawthorn surrogate. But in February the state Supreme Court ordered congressional district lines to be redrawn, and Cawthorn reversed course, filing to seek reelection in his original western North Carolina

home district. Woodhouse has refused to back out. She has joined the Cawthorn critics in calling him "immature" and an embarrassment to western North Carolina.

Through much of this, Cawthorn publicly appears unfazed, even embracing the controversies he fans.

"I don't mind being hated," he told students at Western Carolina University last fall. "Because if I'm hated in Washington, DC but loved at home in North Carolina and loved around the rest of the country, that means I'm doing my job."

April 12 at 4 p.m.

In closed session – which Commissioner Hehn was asked not to attend -- the Highlands Board of Commissioners reviewed a letter from Hehn's attorney requesting redline documents related to the Hotwire contract.

Though neither Town Manager Josh Ward nor Town Attorney Jay Coward have the draft documents and have said so repeatedly, the board directed the town attorney to ask the lawyers who assisted with the contract negotiations from Raleigh and Washington, DC, Jim Baller of Keller & Hickman and Gabriel Du Sablon of Cauley Pridgen, to determine if they had any draft documents from the Hotwire contract.

"If Mr. Baller and/or Mr. De Sablon have any relevant documents they are authorized to provide the documents to the town attorney who can then release them to Mr. Hehn's attorney," said Highlands Mayor Pat Taylor.

The other item discussed in closed session was another letter from Commissioner Hehn's attorney concerning his requested underground electric service removal from his property.

"The town attorney was directed to respond to the letter explaining the Town Board's position and decision on this matter," said Mayor Taylor.

At the March meeting, Commissioner John Dotson supplied a detailed account concerning the issue which led the board to vote unanimously to direct Commissioner Hehn to move the line at his expense and to take care of subsequent power to the adjoining property which would be affected by the removal.

"The plats are recorded," said Dotson. "The first was done by Woodow Wilson, the second one was done by Steve Foster. Mr. Hehn's attorney actually referenced in his deed, the survey which shows the box in existence.

"My take is that if Mr. Hehn wants the box removed more power to him at his expense. The box was there when he bought it. He knew it was there when he bought it. But if Mr. Hehn is going to move it, Mr. Hehn needs to take care of Mr. Taylor's power at Mr. Hehn's expense.

"This survey is in the deed. This is the nail in the coffin. When you take possession of something that is shown on the ground and you reference it in your deed, you're done.

"Based on that, if Mr. Hehn wants to move the box to a more appropriate location

for himself, OK. But he must take into full consideration Mr. Taylor's existing electric service which needs to start and stop exactly where it is now; unless Mr. Taylor decides he would like his service to come to another place. At which point he can dictate to Mr. Hehn what is allowable," said Dotson,

The board voted unanimously to deny the request that the town move the underground power line and to put the burden of moving or changing anything regarding power to his and Taylor's house on him.

Hehn said he the subject Lot 8 Revised, Glendale Subdivision on Nov. 20, 2019, and said he was told by his attorney Fred Jones that there were no easements recorded

"To the best of our knowledge and belief, in 2018, the town constructed an underground power line across our lot to serve 950 Wilson Road without benefit of an easement. And, the town located a new pad mounted transformer on our lot at the same time, also without benefit of an easement. We understand the town's position is if there is no objection in seven years, the line and transformer can remain.

"We are making plans to construct a new home on our lot. Please remove the power line ... remnants and the transformer which damages our lot and restricts the location of the new home," his letter read.

Budget

During the budget part of the workshop commissioners heard Ward's numbers on capital expenses in each of the departments: Street, Sanitation, Electric, Water & Sewer, Police, MIS/GIS and Administration.

The total requested for street department needs – sidewalks, paving and equipment is \$1,011,000

The total for the sanitation department is \$165,000; the electric \$310,000; the water & sewer \$2,858,100, police \$164,500 and MIS/GIS Dept \$65,000.

The other item discussed at length was Cost of Living increases for employees. This year Ward suggested 6% – which the board agreed to with the stipulation that the salaries of all the employees be looked to make sure everyone was getting a minimum of \$15 an hour.

"But no one can even live off \$15 an hour," said Commissioner Dotson.

The board didn't vote on the issue but asked Ward to continue work on the budget and to include \$194,500 in the budget for the COLA increase.
