The Highlands Fire & Rescue Dept. annual award and recognition ceremony was Saturday night at OEI's Spring House where fire-fighters, their families and town commissioners enjoyed a dinner buffet and camaraderie.

Each year members of the department vote to name "Fireman of the Year." This year, for the first time, there was a tie so two were named "Fireman of the Year," RL Wilson and David Leffler.

Officers for 2024 were rec-

ognized as were Eric Pierson and Jimmy Petrone for being 25-year members of the Rescue Association

The department was busy 2023 tallying 730 calls requiring 1,875 manhours which was up from 2022's 683 calls amounting to 1,477 manhours.

# MCS Capitol Projects update - what's next?

Macon County Schools (MCS) is moving forward into 2024 with various key infrastructure projects ranging from track improvements at Macon Middle School (MMS) to the much-anticipated construction of a new Franklin High School (FHS).

#### New Franklin High School Grant:

Last week, NC Superintendent of Public Instruction Catherine Truitt surprised county leaders when she presented Macon County Schools with a grant of \$62 million to help fund the construction of a new Franklin High School. Truitt commended the Career and Technical Education (CTE) offerings in the grant application, highlighting the appeal of these programs.

"Our rural counties do a better job of ensuring that there are multiple pathways for students to consider so we don't have to tell all students that the only pathway to the middle class is through a four-year residential college degree," Truitt said.

MCS received the maximum possible amount from the Needs Based Public School Capital Fund grant, making it the first school system awarded the grant in this cycle. The estimated cost of the FHS project is over \$100 million, indicating the significance of this grant in realizing the new school's construction.

Various officials and community members, including N.C. Sen. Kevin Corbin, praised the local planning and preparation for the grant. MCS Superintendent Josh Lynch and School Board Chair Jim Breedlove expressed their excitement about the transformative impact the grant would have on the community and future generations of students.

"I have been on the Board for 15 years, and this is the ultimate! Since I have been on the Board, this is one of the things we have strived for is to bring this opportunity to our students and we're here. This is incredibly exciting and beyond words!" – School

uesday, January 23, 2024, will be a day Maconians will remember for years to come. On that day, the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, Catherine Truitt, came to Franklin to present a state check of 62 million dollars to build a new Franklin High School.

sioners. Stiehler and Dotson. already had commitments at the time of the meeting, but both told me to convey their support for the new school. Commissioners Patterson, Pierson, and Weller attended the meeting. We had the honor of sitting next to the members of the Macon Board of Education while Senator Corbin and Superintendent Truitt made their presentations.

At our call on Friday, Senator Corbin stressed to me that the county needed to come together to ask the state to di-


I thought the meeting was going to be a last pitch sales effort to the state superintendent about the county's need and commitment to build a new school.

Midway through Truitt's remarks, a man walked into the room with a cardboard document in his hand. He told the superintendent that she had left it in the car. The superintendent took the piece of cardboard and turned it around to reveal the 62 million dollar check. It's hard to describe the joy and excitement that the reveal generated among the officials in the room.

After the meeting, I told Senator Corbin that he and Representative Gillespie were the mailmen for Western North Carolina. They made sure those state checks supporting this region were mailed and delivered. They played a key role with the state in securing these critical funds.

So, now that the state has weighed in with about half the funding for the new school, it is now time for Macon County to move forward with this project without delay. If funds from the county reserved fund are needed, so be it. If the county has to borrow money to build the high school, let's do it. With this wonderful state support, now is not the time to attempt a scale-down of the project. Like the state, Macon County needs to invest in building a high school that will serve the educational needs of our young people for years to come.



Bob is survived by his wife Wanda and daughter Kasev of Highlands, NC; sister Karen Balkman of Roswell, NM and


brother James of Houston, TX. Celebrations of life will be held in both Highlands, NC and Atlanta, GA in the spring.

people to their primary care physician as well as the Emergency Room and even to the hospital.

Respiratory syncytial virus, also called human respiratory syncytial virus and human orthopneumovirus, is a contagious virus that causes infections of the respiratory tract – different from the flu and COVID19.

At the Jan. 23 MC Board of Health and Human Services board meeting, a dashboard created by the NC Dept. of Health and Human Services - similar to the one first broadcasted when CO-VID19 was rampant in 2020 and 2021 - was presented.

The dashboard tracks information about cases presented at hospitals and ERs – those reporting information about North Carolinians with contagious respiratory viruses that can cause cold symptoms or severe breathing problems, including COVID-19, the flu (Influenza), and RSV.

Though typically a few weeks behind, the dashboard is updated every Wednesday at https://covid19.ncdhhs.gov/dashboard and compares figures one week to the next.

The MC Health Dept. board was presented the dashboards -- Dashboard #1 and Dashboard #2 -- each with two charts.

One chart in Dashboard #1 tallied ER visits for Total Respiratory Viruses including COV-ID19, RSV and Flu-like symptoms and the other chart just tallied RSV symptoms.

Dashboard #2 also featured two charts – one that tallied hospital admissions due to the flu and one that tallied admissions to due COVID19.

As of the week ending Jan. 20, 11.8% of ER visits had symptoms of a respiratory virus, a decrease from the week before. The week before was 14.3%.

As of the week ending Jan. 20, among reporting hospitals, 717 hospital admissions for CO-VID19 and 308 were for the flu. This represents a decrease for COVID19 and a decrease for flu from the week of Jan. 13. The week before was 899 for COVID19 and 504 for the flu.

There are no statistics regarding the result of primary care visits and testing for either respiratory viruses or COVID19.

There are now vaccines for all three viruses – COVID19, Flu and RSV.

# Make 2024 the year you get a high school certificate

For those who haven't received their high school diploma, The Literacy & Learning Center (TL&LC) has a free program to help people achieve that goal this year!

A high school equivalency certificate (HSE) certificate can open the door to more advanced jobs and higher pay. It also ensures that ongoing employment is more likely throughout one's life. These advantages lead to a higher quality of life for the certificate holder and even extend to one's children and grandchildren through better overall health and well-being.

Better known as General Education Development, (GED) this program is divided into four testing categories: language arts, mathemat-

ics, science, and social studies. The computer-based test is available for anyone 16 or older who is not enrolled in school.

An alternate option is the paperbased HiSET, with the categories of writing, reading, mathematics, science, and social studies. Anyone 18 or older (or 16 and up with special approval) qualifies in North Carolina.

Both options of equivalency tests measure foundational core knowledge and skills and demonstrate one has the exact comprehension as a traditional high school graduate. An HSE certificate is evidence of essential workforce skills and college readiness and is generally accepted on the same basis as a high school diploma.

The Literacy & Learning Center offers free self-paced online test prep with a companion book through Kaplan, Lessons, accessed around the student's schedule, help strengthen weaker areas. Videos are provided to explain concepts, and practice questions are included. When students are fully prepared, they simply need to find a suitable testing date at a local official testing center, such as Southwestern Community College, and TL&LC will assist with arrangements and payment.

without a tax increase.

"With the grant, there should be no tax increase whatsoever to build the high school. Now to be more clear on that, with the grant, let's say we get the \$60 million grant, if we choose to build Phase 1 out of the fund balance. roughly \$13-\$14 million, we are

not financing this full \$120 million," said Commissioner Antoine.

The FHS Project has often been referenced in the past as county officials debated other capitol projects, such as upgrades and renovations to Highlands School that would result in providing Pre-K classes for the first time.

With half of the FHS project capitol projects there.



have always enjoyed jumping off things. Whether that was bridges, rocks in the forest, or cliffs in the Dominican Re-Lpublic, each time you jump, there is a feeling of falling that is unlike any other sense. It feels like your stomach is moving towards your throat, and time seems to stand still.

Last summer, I attended Young Life Camp at Windy Gap outside of Asheville. Young Life is a fantastic organization that introduces students to Jesus. Camp is an incredible experience full of adventure, friendships, and the opportunity to learn about faith in Jesus. Camp has high ropes courses, zip lines, and many other fun activities.

We arrived at camp, and one of my high school friends asked me to jump off the high jump into the lake. I didn't hesitate because I have always enjoyed jumping off high stuff. One thing that has changed is that I am in my mid-40s now. I am starting to realize that I can't do some of the things that I used to do, or at least can't do them as quickly.

We get up to the top of the jump, and I notice that it seems slightly higher than I imagined. I was committed in my mind to just climb the ladder and not hesitate, to walk to the end of the platform and jump. Even though I was a little nervous, I decided to take a step of faith and jump.

When was the last time you took a step of faith?

A step of faith requires trust. As I stepped off the tower towards the lake, I believed everything would be OK because I had jumped before. I knew what to expect. Uncertainty can make it difficult for us to take steps of faith.

I wonder if we live such insulated, comfortable lives that many of us never take steps of faith. Our lives are not void of good things; we attend church and try to be good people, but many of us are unwilling to budge out of our comfort zones. Honestly, we are stuck in the routine of our lives, and the most challenging part of this reality is that our faith does not grow unless we take steps of faith. For many, this means our faith in God is stagnant or non-existent.

What is a step of faith?

The scriptures would define a step of faith as a deliberate choice of trusting God versus trusting in our wisdom and perspective. It can be challenging to exercise faith because we have spent most of our lives making decisions based on what is comfortable, easy, and predictable. We don't know what will happen, so we remain frozen, almost like a person stuck at the top of a high jump, overwhelmed with the thought of

If you read and study the life of Jesus, it is easy to see that following after Jesus is not easy. The way of the cross leads us to the death of our independence. I believe many don't take steps of faith because of an unwillingness to give up their way. I admit there is a power struggle to give up my desires and plans. Giving up our way and trusting God is where our faith begins to grow. If Christianity is nothing more than attend-



Several of the grants awarded in 2023 are aimed at supporting behavioral and mental health initiatives for the young generation in our community. The grants will fund a full range of programs and services that cater

to the specific healthcare needs of our youth. The initiatives supported through these grants include mental health professionals, school nurses, foster family counseling, prevention programs, and support for at-risk youth. Apart from these grants, there were also additional awards given to help expand access to healthcare and provide chronic disease management assistance to uninsured patients.

"Our commitment to enhancing the health and well-being of Highlands, Cashiers, and the surrounding communities remains strong," stated Muir. "We are excited to continue the work we started in February 2019, aiming to implement impactful and lasting solutions that address health challenges in our communities and truly make a positive difference in people's lives."

Wright also explained that the Highlands-Cashiers Hospital's designation as a Stroke Ready Hospital means that all of the national best practices are in place to treat a stoke patient as required by the Joint Commission that accredits health care organizations.




